

Valentine's concert planned

The University School of Music will present several jazz ensemble groups in concert at 8 tonight in Beall Hall.

Performing groups include jazz quintet and the 14-member new Experimental Jazz Ensemble, which will represent the School of Music at the forthcoming All-Northwest Music Conference in Billings, Mont.

The jazz ensembles emphasize jazz improvisation in various contemporary style, and compositions from all periods of jazz are utilized in their performances. Instruments usually found in jazz music are included in the various groups, and some unusual percussion and wind instruments are used as well, such as xylophone and french horn.

Among the soloists appearing are two solo award winners from the 1978 Berkley Jazz Festival Combo Division. Other musicians in groups appearing Wednesday night have performed throughout the Northwest at various jazz clubs and public schools and colleges.

Admission to the concert is \$2 for adults, \$1 for students. Funds raised will go to the support of jazz studies at the School of Music.

Students due for refunds

Students who have paid income tax on National Research Service Awards during the years 1974 to the present are due for a refund.

The Revenue Act of 1978 declares that such awards are to be treated as a scholarship or fellowship grant and are thus not taxable. The provision makes that ruling effective for awards made during calendar years 1974-1979.

Under the law, anyone who filed tax returns and paid the tax with respect to awards made during those years should file for a refund. The basic manner for claiming a refund is to file Form 1040X showing an adjustment for exclusion of the fellowship or fellowship portion of the award.

Any awards made during 1978 and 1979 will be treated as scholarships even though payments on those awards may be made in later years.

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Retailers work with heart group to raise funds

Labor leader to speak

Harry Bridges, an elder statesman of American labor and president emeritus of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, will be the featured speaker Friday, February 16, at a benefit for the Wayne Morse Chair in Law and Politics at the University.

The dinner, to be held at the Rodeway Inn in Springfield, is sponsored by Oregon labor leaders, including Irv Fletcher, executive secretary of the Lane County Labor Council, and Pat Randall, secretary-treasurer of the Oregon AFL-CIO. The occasion is to honor the memory of Wayne Morse, who died in 1974, and to raise funds to endow a permanent, rotating all-University chair in his name.

Morse, who served 15 years as a member of the faculty and dean of the University law school and 24 years in the U.S. Senate, was considered by many, including labor leader George Meany, to be a friend of labor. Meany said it was "not because Morse was beholden to labor, but because his largeness of heart and mind made him a champion of the plain people, the advocate of the little man surrounded by forces and aspirations beyond his reach."

The establishment of a Wayne Morse Chair in Law and Politics at the University of Oregon is to "honor his achievements and carry forward the principles of one of America's most distinguished legal scholars and public servants." In August 1977 Congress authorized an appropriation of up to \$500,000 to match private donations one-to-one.

Tickets to Friday's benefit at \$25 per person, include a \$15 donation to the chair's endowment.

The dinner speaker is a towering figure in the history of organized labor.

Harry Bridges was president of the ILWU for 43 years, retiring in 1977 at the age of 75.
