

Work begins on building

Construction has begun on a \$1.9 million addition to the University's College of Education.

Robert Gilberts, dean of the college, said the two-story, 13,300 square-foot addition will be completed in about 18 months and will provide office space and teaching laboratories for the college's Division of Teacher Education.

Half the funding for the project was granted by the 1977 Legislature and the remainder will be financed with the sale of state general obligation bonds.

The college's programs have been scattered in as many as 16 different locations across campus in recent years, Gilberts says. The college's faculty was ranked the 13th best in the country in a recent national survey published in The Chronicle of Higher Education.
