

Joyous Ducks finally win a close one

Dan Hartshorne hit a turn-around jumper over Washington's James Woods with two seconds left to give the Ducks a 73-71 comeback win over the Huskies in McArthur Court Monday night.

"I'm very happy tonight — it's the greatest feeling, I tell you," said an exuberant Hartshorne, who ended the game with 10 points and four rebounds.

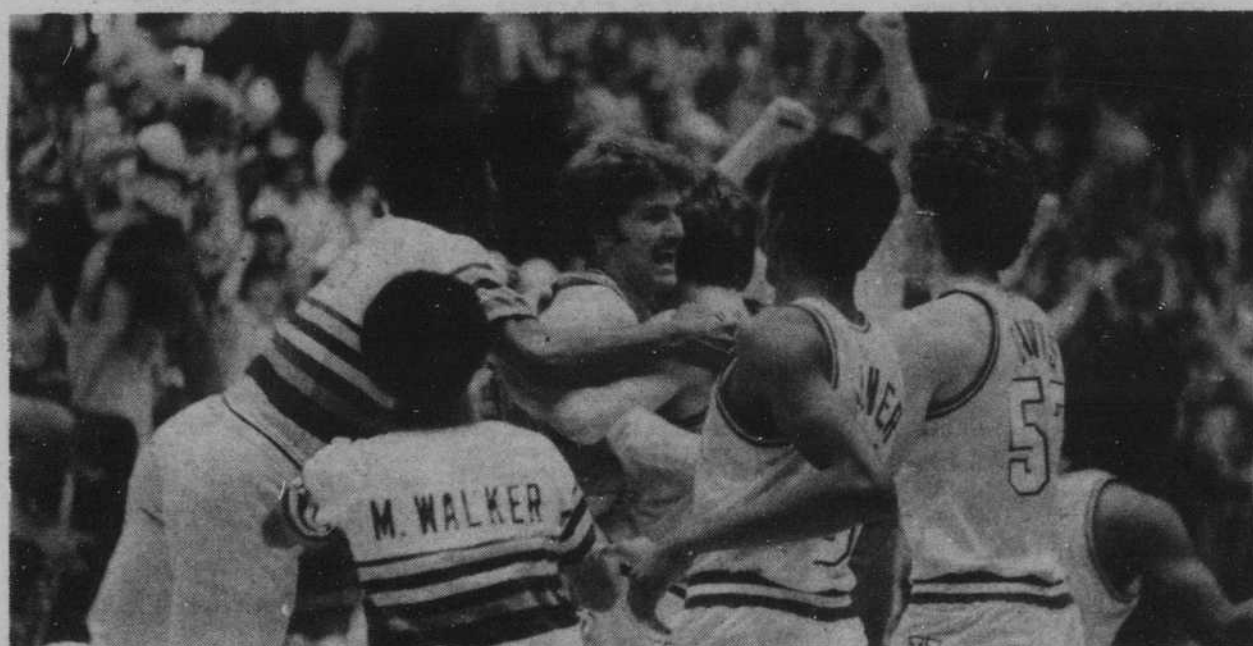
For awhile though, it looked as though the Ducks (5-10 in conference, 10-14 overall) had run into a brick wall. In the first half, 7' 2" Husky center Petur Gudmundsson led Washington to a 14-4 lead, and the Ducks had to play catch-up.

But Gudmundsson fouled out with 2:39 left in the game, leaving the door open for Hartshorne to score six of the Ducks' last eight points.

Gudmundsson scored 28 points and had 13 rebounds, but Oregon coach Jim Haney said the Huskies relied too much on the sophomore from Reykjavik, Iceland. "He played very well, but they looked to him so much that when he wasn't in there they became stagnant in their offense."

With Gudmundsson out, Hartshorne had no doubt about taking the last shot. "I felt confident when I went up, and that's all you can ask for," he said.

Haney echoed Hartshorne's feelings. "It was a good shot and he put the ball in the basket."

The win ended a three-game home losing streak for the Ducks, and though Oregon has no chance for a winning record, Haney is still pleased with the team. "I will never have more respect, pride and admiration than for this group," he said.

"We all want to win, but these guys are winners in life and that's more important," added the first-year coach.

It doesn't hurt being winners in college basketball either, a fact

Haney readily admitted. "Anyone who tells you it's not better to win than lose is crazy."

Though the wins have been sparse this year, and the Ducks had lost the previous two games by a total of three points, the Ducks have been improving, Haney said.

Sophomore forward Mike Clark led the Ducks with five rebounds, and drew praise from Haney for his hustle.

"Mike has now played four fine games in a row, and I'm really

pleased with his performance," said Haney. "I'm pleased with all of their performances."

Haney may also have been pleased with the performance of the Mac Court crowd, who got the scoreboard bouncing several times, and shouted choruses of "sit down, Marv" every time Washington coach Marv Harshman stood up.

Harshman and the Huskies eventually did sit down, and the fans could be heard saying "thank you" as they left Mac Court.

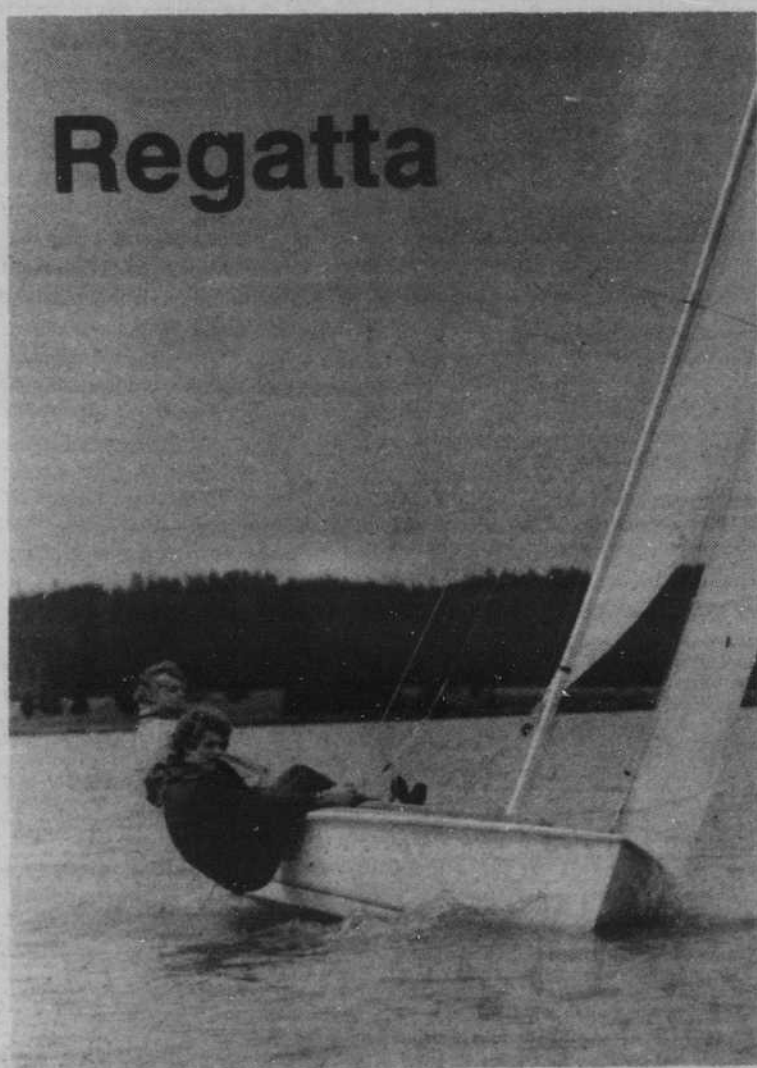


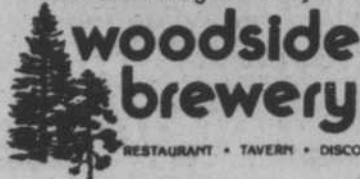

Golfers face tough field in Hawaii

The University men's golf team will be in Maui, Hawaii this week to compete in the John A. Burns Intercollegiate Golf Tournament, and to get a jump on its rivals in the long season ahead.

The Ducks, led by seniors Jeff Sanders and Jon Heselwood, will seek to improve on their seventh-place finish last year in the 54-hole tourney, but will be hard pressed by teams like Brigham Young and San Jose State.

Oregon head coach Jim Ferguson will rely

heavily on Sanders, an All-American in 1976 before a back injury, and Heselwood, who finished fourth in the Stanford Invitational tournament among players from 13 teams.

"Jeff and Jon are one of the best one-two combinations in the nation this year," says Ferguson, "but I'm not as sure about the rest of the team."

Four other varsity players will make the trip to Hawaii, including Glen Luikhart, Scott Krieger, Mike Marcum and Dave Delong.
