

Library offers service

The University's library is once again offering a term paper advisory service through March 7.

The service features expert help from University librarians. Claire Meyer, a University librarian and head of the Catalog Information Service, says, "It's a personal, particular, customized service for people who feel doubtful in their approach to the library."

The service consists of two parts. First is a brief preliminary interview between the student and any librarian at the Catalog Information Service Desk located on the main floor of the library.

Following the interview is a half-hour appointment with a librarian who has expertise in a particular subject area. University librarians have a wide range of academic backgrounds.

During the preliminary interview the student and librarian try to work out a specific topic for the student.

Once a topic is selected, the librarian can assist the student in finding pertinent information.

The time between the preliminary interview and appointment gives the librarian a chance to think about the student's topic and decide on effective means of researching.

Students also fill out forms listing their major, related course, and various reference sources so the librarian can have some idea of the professor's expectations and which library sources the student has already used.

Meyer suggests that students "try to be different from the rest of the class if the assignment allows it, and pick a topic you can get excited about."
