

Gas emergency plan waits on 'standby'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Carter administration proposed a standby gasoline rationing plan Tuesday that assigns no specific amount to individuals and could be used only in an energy emergency.

The fuel conservation plan made public by the Energy Department proposes to ration gasoline by mailing gasoline allotment "checks" to owners of registered vehicles. These could then be "cashed in" for ration coupons at banks or other institutions.

The proposal is to be formally submitted Thursday to Congress, which then has 60 days to approve or disapprove it. The plan could not take effect unless the president declared a national energy emergency and won approval of its implementation by both

the House and Senate.

The plan assigns no specific amounts. This determination would be made when necessary, depending on the available gasoline supply and the best current estimates of vehicle consumption.

Besides the gasoline rationing plan, the proposal includes provisions for fuel-saving actions such as restricting gasoline sales on weekends, restricting temperatures in commercial and public buildings and by restricting unnecessary advertising lighting.

Under a law passed by Congress in 1975, the president was required to submit such standby fuel conservation plans to the lawmakers.

Carter asks Chinese to end invasion of Vietnam's border

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — China reported Tuesday that Vietnamese troops launched several counter-invasions into Chinese territory in the previous few days, but were driven back each time.

Intelligence sources here said China appears to show no intention of withdrawing from Vietnam and has even moved to reinforce its troops along Vietnam's northeastern front, where some of the Vietnamese incursions reportedly took place.

In his bluntest comment on the 10-day conflict, Pres. Carter asked China on Tuesday to undertake "a speedy withdrawal" from Vietnam. The request was in a message given to top Chinese leaders by Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal, who is visiting Peking.

In Washington, Carter said at a news conference that he has made known to the Chinese his "firm disapproval" of their invasion but said it would be coun-

terproductive to terminate the newfound relations with Peking.

The Vietnamese, meanwhile, claimed that they wiped out 2,200 Chinese soldiers in four days, 800 of them Monday in clashes along the northeastern coastal front.

In the northwest, Vietnam reported its troops were locked in combat with the Chinese 15 miles inside Vietnam along the banks of

the Red River, the vital water corridor to the capital of Hanoi.

The official Chinese news agency Hsinhua reported Tuesday from Peking that a battalion of Vietnamese troops attacked a commune on the Kwangsi border Sunday, but Chinese soldiers and militiamen fought back, wiping out some of the invading troops and driving the rest back across the border.

Israelis balk at Mideast peace summit meeting

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's Cabinet rejected Pres. Carter's call for a Mideast summit Tuesday and accused Egypt of stiffening terms for a treaty. The action plunged the peace process to a low point since Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's historic trip to Jerusalem 15 months ago.

Egypt and Israel indicated the next move is up to the United States. An administration spokesman in Washington said initial White House reaction was one "of grave concern about what the decision means for the peace process" but withheld elaboration pending more information.

The scuttled Camp David summit would have involved Carter, Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian Prime Minister Mustafa Khalil.

A message from Begin detailing the Cabinet action arrived in Washington for Carter later Tuesday. The contents were not disclosed but an administration official said the message "would give us better sense of what it means."

Several Israeli ministers reportedly were unhappy that Sadat picked Khalil to negotiate for him, but no mention of that was in the Cabinet statement read by a somber-faced Begin.
