GTFs to get health money

The \$25,000 health care fund awarded to GTFs in the recent contract settlement between the University and the Graduate Teaching Fellows Federation should be ready for distribution soon.

Jeff Edmundson, GTFF vice president, and Dave Cunningham, the University official in charge of contract enforcement, estimated Thursday that checks made out to about 325 GTFs who applied for a share of the fund should be ready "in a week to 10 days."

Campus doors stay open

Students remaining on campus during spring vacation will find most University services open.

The EMU will close Friday at 4 p.m., reopening March 19 at 9 a.m. Through the 23, the building will be open between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Although the EMU will close the 24, it will be open Sunday, the 25, from noon to 11:30 p.m., and will resume regular hours March 26.

The University Bookstore will hold regular business hours throughout the break, as will Oregon Hall offices. The University library will be open from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m., between March 11 and 18. It will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., closing March 24 and 25.

The Student Health Center will close its doors throughout the break, reopening March 25 at 3 p.m.

Child care surveyed

The University Child Commission will conduct a survey of student-parent child care needs in the spring term registration packet.

The commission is studying child care needs of the entire University community and will make recommendations to Pres. William Boyd for improved services. The commission grew out of the collective bargaining contract between the Graduate Fellows Federation and the University.
