

New scholarship started

A tuition scholarship for students in journalism at the University has been started by two Oregon newspapers, the East Oregonian in Pendleton, and the Daily Astorian in Astoria.

The new grant is named for the late Merle Chessman, who was editor of the Astorian-Budget from 1919 to 1947 and was a member of the Oregon State Senate. Chessman grew up in the Eugene area and was a graduate of the University.

The journalism grant will be limited to University journalism students who have graduated from high school in the Pendleton and Astoria areas — Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Wheeler, Grant, Clatsop, Tillamook and Columbia counties.

Deadline for the Chessman grant at Oregon is Saturday.

Summer jobs sought

The Lane County Summer Youth Employment Program is seeking summer jobs for youth, ages 14 to 21.

This program has been in operation for the past four years, and each year public and private non-profit agencies throughout Lane County have created individual positions or special projects for youth within their agencies.

The program develops subsidized work experience positions and then matches youth to the jobs. The positions need not be elementary, as some youth participants will have work skills.

Wages and Worker's Compensation for eligible youth participants are paid for by the program out of federal funds administered by the Lane County Employment and Training Division.

Employers will be responsible for supervising the participants. In order to match youth to work placements where they are likely to succeed, a position request form must be completed.

All forms are due in the office at 135 E. 6th Ave. on April 4.

Solar session to be offered this weekend

Representatives from the Solar Energy Center at the University and the Oregon State University Extension Service will conduct a solar workshop during the Sweet Home-East Linn Chamber of Commerce Home and Energy Fair, which is slated Friday through Sunday.

Hybrid Instrumentation Technology of Sweet Home, will assist in the solar workshop activities, which are scheduled Friday from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The workshop, focusing on the construction of solar collector units, will assume an assembly line approach, with each participant rotating from stations, experiencing the total fabrication process.

Interested participants are requested to pre-register by writing to the Sweet Home Chamber at 1310 Long St., Sweet Home or by calling 376-6186. Space at the solar workshop is limited to 30 people and the fee is set at \$5 per participant.

The Home and Energy Fair will present speakers from the OSU Extension Service, which will provide materials, literature and talks on efficient home heating.

The Fair also features booth exhibits, centralizing on the progressive use of materials in home designing and energy conservation.
