Among the featured speakers is Ken Kesey, author of "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest," who will give the keynote address at 11:30 a.m. in 229 Law.

Other seminar participants are Lane County Circuit Court Judge William Beckett, commitment team member Greg Wagner and counseling psychologist Isabelle Moser.

The workshop is sponsored by the University Status of Women Committee.

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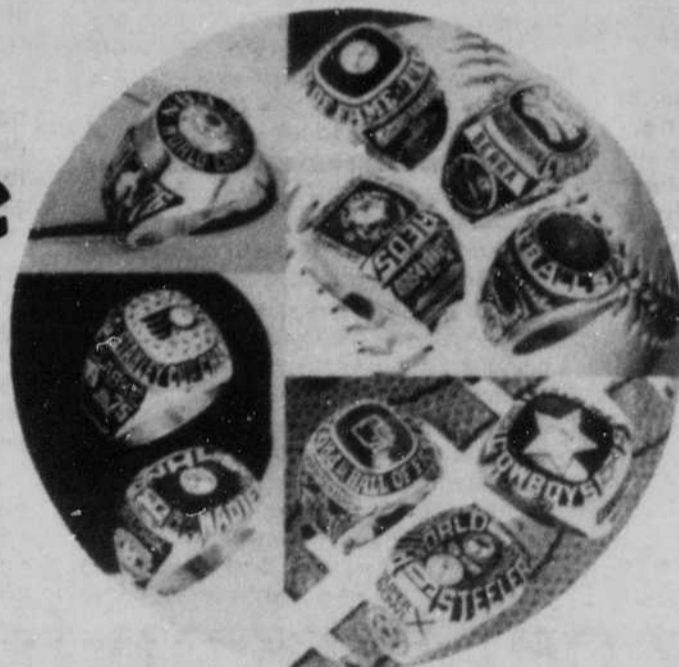
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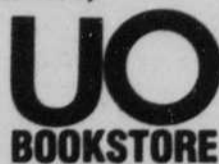
