

Amin's fall celebrated

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) — Ugandans in Easter finery gave thanks for liberation from Idi Amin at Easter services Sunday while religious leaders called for peace and an end to looting.

Tanzanian and Uganda exile troops continued searching for Amin. There was a report from Ugandan refugees fleeing into Kenya that the dictator was seen Saturday in a northern village near the border with Zaire.

Journalists exploring Amin's residential lodge found a case of old films — recalling Amin's favorite pastime of movie-watching. Included were reels of the "I Love Lucy" television show and "Tom and Jerry" cartoons.

While there were signs of normal activity in Kampala, northern and eastern Uganda were still gripped by lawless-

ness. There were reports of thousands of Ugandans fleeing east into neighboring Kenya.

Refugees arriving in Kampala said stragglers from the remnants of Amin's army were wandering about in the north searching for food and looting. Sectarian killings were reported at Tororo and Soroti in eastern Uganda, apparently against Moslems who had dominated the government under Amin.

Worshippers gathered in the Ugandan capital in long, bright dresses, dark suits and flower-decked hats. Uganda is predominantly Christian despite the Moslem Amin's attempts to portray it as an Islamic state.

"I stopped going to church because I thought God had forgotten us," said a worshipper at the Anglican All Saint's Cathedral. "Now I can go again."

Inside, Archbishop Sylvanus Wani praised the new administration of provisional President Yussufu Lule for its "Brave and friendly action in liberating the people of Uganda."

Wani's predecessor, Archbishop Janani Luwum, was killed in a car accident — allegedly engineered by Amin in February 1977 — while awaiting trial for "treason."

A group of Indian road workers said they saw Amin on Saturday with a group of bodyguards in a radio-equipped jeep near Arua, in Amin's home province in northwestern Uganda.

Oil sources in Nairobi said Friday that Amin's private jet had been refueled at Soroti in eastern Uganda, and speculation was that he would use the plane to fly from Arua to Libya or the Sudan.

NEW YORK — Gasoline prices in the first three months of this year have risen by about as much as they did during the Arab oil embargo in the first quarter of 1974, according to a newsletter that follows the gasoline industry.

The latest edition of the Lundberg Letter says the average price of a gallon of gasoline has jumped about 12 percent — from 67.99 cents to 76.22 cents — since Jan. 1.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — A major earthquake ripped across the rocky Adriatic coast of southern Yugoslavia early Sunday, killing about 200 persons, the official Belgrade Radio reported.

The quake, centered in the Adriatic Sea near the coastal resort of Dubrovnik, tore open hotels, hospitals, factories and homes along the coast, the agency reported.

As rescue operations began, officials said they feared that more dead may be buried under the rubble.

PARIS — Environmentalists have won a court order forcing a utility company to halt work temporarily on four nuclear reactors near Orleans on grounds they might pollute underground water supplies.

A coalition of activists, farmers and municipalities contended that Electricite de France, the national power company, had failed to carry out an adequate environmental impact study.

The 1,300-megawatt reactors, being built under license from the Westinghouse Corp. on France's Loire River, are to begin operating in 1986. Construction began in January.

WASHINGTON — President Carter's campaign to curb overseas arms sales has not reduced the flow of weapons to Third World countries and "there is universal skepticism" about the future of the policy, a Senate report said Sunday.

The study by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said the unilateral effort by the United States "is under attack from both critics and supporters."

"It is criticized on the one hand for lack of vigorous implementation and on the other for placing the United States at a competitive disadvantage in the world's arms markets," the study said.

Pope asks for peace

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II appealed for peace and respect for human rights in his Easter message Sunday, delivered to 350,000 pilgrims and tourists in St. Peter's Square. He called Easter "the day of universal hope."

As the festive crowd, one of the largest in Vatican history, called out "Viva il Papa" ("Long live the pope") and held up their national flags, the pontiff gave Easter greetings in 32 languages — apologizing if he mispronounced any.

The pope wished peace to all those who suffer, are humiliated, disappointed, oppressed, repressed and to those whose human dignity is violated.

Repeating the greeting of the risen Christ, "Peace Be With You," he made special mention of those places where he said peace "is particularly relevant and particularly awaited" — the Middle East, Africa, Asia, Latin America and the "peoples who live in the various social, economic and political systems."

About 8,000 Italians taking part in a peace march to focus attention on the plight of starving children walked to the edge of the vast cobblestone square carrying orange flowers, palm leaves and signs.

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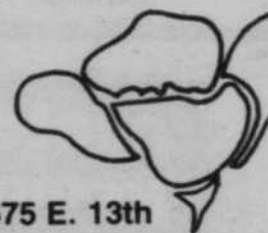
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
