

Students receive honors

Two groups of University students have taken top prizes in a public service campaign competition, and two students have earned a cash award at the intercollegiate Bridge Championships.

The two groups, coached by journalism Prof. Willis Winter took top prizes at this year's Intercollegiate Public Service Campaign Competition held recently at the University of Portland.

The awards marked the fourth time in the last five years that University students have won the competition.

A \$1,000 prize for best campaign will be shared by Bob Petow, Mark Sleasman, Wilma Shouse and Mary Galluzzo. Their winning entry concerned the dangers of hypothermia, or loss of body heat, as a cause of drowning among swimmers.

Trophies for the best commercial and for best presentation went to the team of Mary Center, Laurel Hanson, George Wooding and Fred Langbecker. Their project was based on the message, "Take some time for yourself."

The two groups spent approximately 10 weeks preparing their winning entries.

The annual competition is sponsored by the Portland chapter of the American Adver-

tising Federation and is judged by professional advertisers from its membership.

Two University students earned a \$500 award at the 1979 Intercollegiate Bridge Championships, but the title and an additional \$2,000 in scholarship funds went to the University of Pennsylvania.

Herbert Alward, a graduate student in mathematics, and Paul Craviotto, a senior in sociology, represented the University in the two-day finals held at the headquarters of the American Contract Bridge League. They were among 15 pairs of students battling through three round-robin sessions for the title.

The \$500 qualification award will be made to the University for use as academic scholarships by the Charity Foundation of the American Contract Bridge League. The Intercollegiate tournament is sponsored jointly by the Association of College Unions International and the American Contract Bridge League.

Competitions are open to full-time students, not restricted to undergraduates as are most athletic events. Finalists qualify in campus contests and in elimination rounds held in the 15 districts of the ACU-I.

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Weaver to speak on draft topics
