The University baseball team managed a 3-2 victory over Linfield College in McMinnville Wednesday. The winning run for the Ducks was scored in a tie-breaking 10th inning.

Steve Webber led the Duck victory. After reaching first on a single, he gained third base on a Linfield error. With the bases loaded, the Linfield pitcher walked Kurt Cameron and forced him in for the winning run.

The two other Duck runs were scored in the fourth and sixth innings, while the Linfield runs came in the fifth and seventh innings.

Duck netter readies for weekend match

Men's tennis player Mike DeMong says he didn't have tennis in mind when he moved to Eugene from Colorado four years ago.

"When I came to Oregon, it wasn't related to tennis," says the senior from Denver. "I came out because my brother is here and I just wanted to spend some time out of Colorado."

However, DeMong joined the Oregon tennis team as a junior. "I came out and talked to him (Oregon coach Buzz Summers) and I got to know some of the players really well. So I went out."

DeMong will be playing third doubles for the Ducks when they face Oregon College of Education Friday at 2:30 p.m. at the covered courts.

"I haven't adjusted to the climate yet," says DeMong, "but I'm really satisfied with the coaching. Buzz has helped my game a lot."

DeMong has also helped Oregon. "He uses his head better than any player on the team," says Summers. "and he mixes up his shots well."

DeMong did play for Lane Community College as a sophomore. But that was only an experiment. "It was easy for me to go there at the time and I was not sure whether I wanted to go to Oregon," DeMong says. As a freshman, he played

for the University of Colorado.

However, his position at Oregon has been somewhat unstable. "I have been moved around a lot. I don't worry about what position I play," he says. "I have enough trust in coach Summers to let him decide that."

In Colorado, DeMong was ranked ninth in the Intermountain region for singles when he was 16, but his specialty is doubles. "I have always done better in doubles," he says. "I'm playing as good now as I ever have. That makes competing that much more fun."

"I think the California trip (in March) helped my game a lot," says DeMong. "And I have been working on my backhand quite a bit. I'm getting more confident in hitting topspin."

DeMong's doubles partner, Tom Greider, describes him as steady. "He does not waste shots," says Greider, "and I would say he is one of our stronger doubles players."

DeMong also has the proper attitude for tennis. "I follow the idea of letting it happen rather than making it happen," he says. "I try not to let any anxiety come over me. From my own experience, I know it is easy to get rattled by a bad call or

something else."

Summers is preaching the same philosophy. "I have noticed that he has loosened up and it has helped us a lot. It helps when things are done in a relaxed, easy going manner."

As for the OCE match, Summers says, "They are not very strong. We are not going to play the top lineup. I am going to give the lower part a chance to play."

The Ducks play OCE Friday at 2:30 p.m.

The tennis team lost to the University of Portland Wednesday 6-3, leaving the Ducks with a 7-10 season record.

In singles action Jerry Farmer defeated Kim Gory, 6-4, 6-4, in the number one spot and Greider downed Doug Menke, 6-2, 4-6, 6-4.
