

## Students capture awards

Three University business students won individual awards at a State Leadership Conference held recently in Sun River.

Students from 14 colleges and universities in Oregon participated in the conference, which was sponsored by Phi Beta Lambda, a national business student organization. Four first place awards for group competition also were given to the University chapter of the organization.

The following students were winners of individual awards.

Daniel Gargan, a junior in business administration, placed third in the marketing competition. Joseph Andre, a senior in management, placed second in the finance and business law competition.

Julie Berg, a senior in management, won the "Ms. Future Business Executive" competition. She also earned second place in the economics competition and third in the finance competition.

## Theatre starts recruiting
