

## S. African slide show set

Candice Wright and Steve Goldfield have recently returned from a three-month stay in southern Africa where they lived with and interviewed farmers, factory workers, political activists and military leaders.

They were among the first westerners to visit the Zimbabwean refugee camps in Zambia and Mozambique after raids by Rhodesian forces.

Wright will give a slide-illustrated public presentation at 8 p.m. tonight on women's experiences in southern Africa, titled "women's emancipation: the long, hard road."

Wright and Goldfield will be in Eugene today and Wednesday and are staging a press conference at 9:30 a.m. today in Harris Hall at Eight Avenue and Oak Street.

## AFS host families needed

The American Field Service Program's south Eugene chapter is looking for families to host 16 to 18-year-old students from one of 60 countries for next school year. The students will attend classes at South Eugene High School.

AFS is a private, non-profit, international organization providing an exchange program between the United States and foreign nations. Families are expected to provide food, lodging and help with small incidental expenses for their guests.

Bladine is visiting the University this week, through Thursday. Sterling will visit the week of May 14.

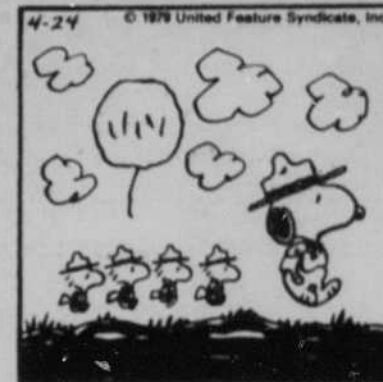
## Corrections, amplifications
