form skits satirizing nuclear power.

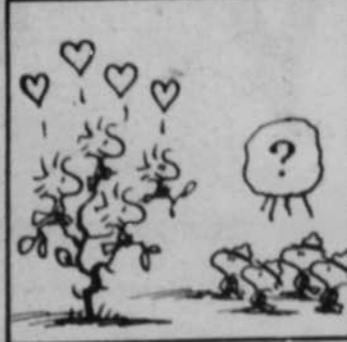
