

German prof to lecture

A German professor from Duke University will discuss modern German literature Thursday at 3:30 p.m. in 204 Condon Hall.

James Rolleston will speak on "Nietzsche, Expressionism and Modern Poetics." The lecture is free and the public is welcome.

Rolleston's topic concerns the influence of 19th century German philosopher Friedrich Wilhelm Nietzsche on poetic theory in 20th century German literature.

University Philosophy Prof. Arnulf Zweig says Nietzscheism was influential in the development of existentialism, the 20th century philosophical theory which stresses man's responsibility for making himself what he is in life, and expresses man's intense awareness of his freedom.

Rolleston has written numerous articles on modern German authors, and is the author of two books, "Rilke in Translation" and "Kafka's Narrative Theatre." He previously was on the faculty at Accra Academy in Ghana and at Yale University.

Major faces vote today

A proposed interdisciplinary undergraduate major in international studies faces the next to last hurdle in becoming part of University programs today when it comes before the University Assembly at 3:30 p.m. in 150 Geology.

If the international studies program is approved by the Assembly, the proposal will then seek final approval by the State Board of Higher Education.

The program gained a vote of confidence from the University Senate last week when that body voted 27-0-1 in favor of the motion, presented by Prof. Clarence Thurber of the community service and public affairs school.

The Senate amended Thurber's original motion to include provisions for a review of the program after three years to assess its strengths and weaknesses.

Efforts to establish the international studies major were begun two years ago according to Thurber, who serves as chair of the ad hoc committee appointed to study the proposal.
