Holocaust lectures set

Elie Wiesel, noted theologian, novelist and playwright, will give two lectures Tuesday and Wednesday nights at 8 p.m. in the South Eugene High School auditorium.

Wiesel, a survivor of the Nazi extermination camps Auschwitz and Buchenwald, is the Andrew Mellon Professor of the Humanities at Boston University.

"Jeremiah: The Witness of Modern Times" will be the subject of Wiesel's Tuesday lecture. On Wednesday, he will speak on "Brurya: A Woman's Tragedy."
