

Netters prep for regional meet

According to women's tennis coach Marti Schey, the University of Washington once again will be the favorite at the Northern College Women's Sports Association tennis regionals that begin today in Corvallis.

"Washington has won the regional championship the last five years in a row," Schey says. "There is going to be a big battle for the runner-up spot."

Schey says Oregon, Montana State University and Oregon State University may all be fighting over second place. "We are just hoping for a good draw and we are hoping to play our best."

The University finished second at the regionals last

season, but played the University of Washington during the regular season and fell 7-2. "We did better against them this year than we did last year," Schey says.

However, it may not be the same Washington team at the regionals. "It is really unknown since they could have changed their lineup since we last played them," she explains.

Patti McKenna, who had a 7-2 singles record during the regular season, will play number one for the Ducks. Her two losses came against Montana State and Washington.

Patti Marihart was 9-1 in singles for the University and will play number two. But Oregon's hopes will not rest on just the top two players.

"Actually, it is a total team thing," Schey says. "Three four, five and six (singles) count just as much."

The Oregon doubles teams may shine at the regionals. Over the regular season, the Ducks compiled an overall record of 31-9 in doubles matches. Marihart and Tina Nicholson are currently

undefeated in the Northwest with an 8-0 record.

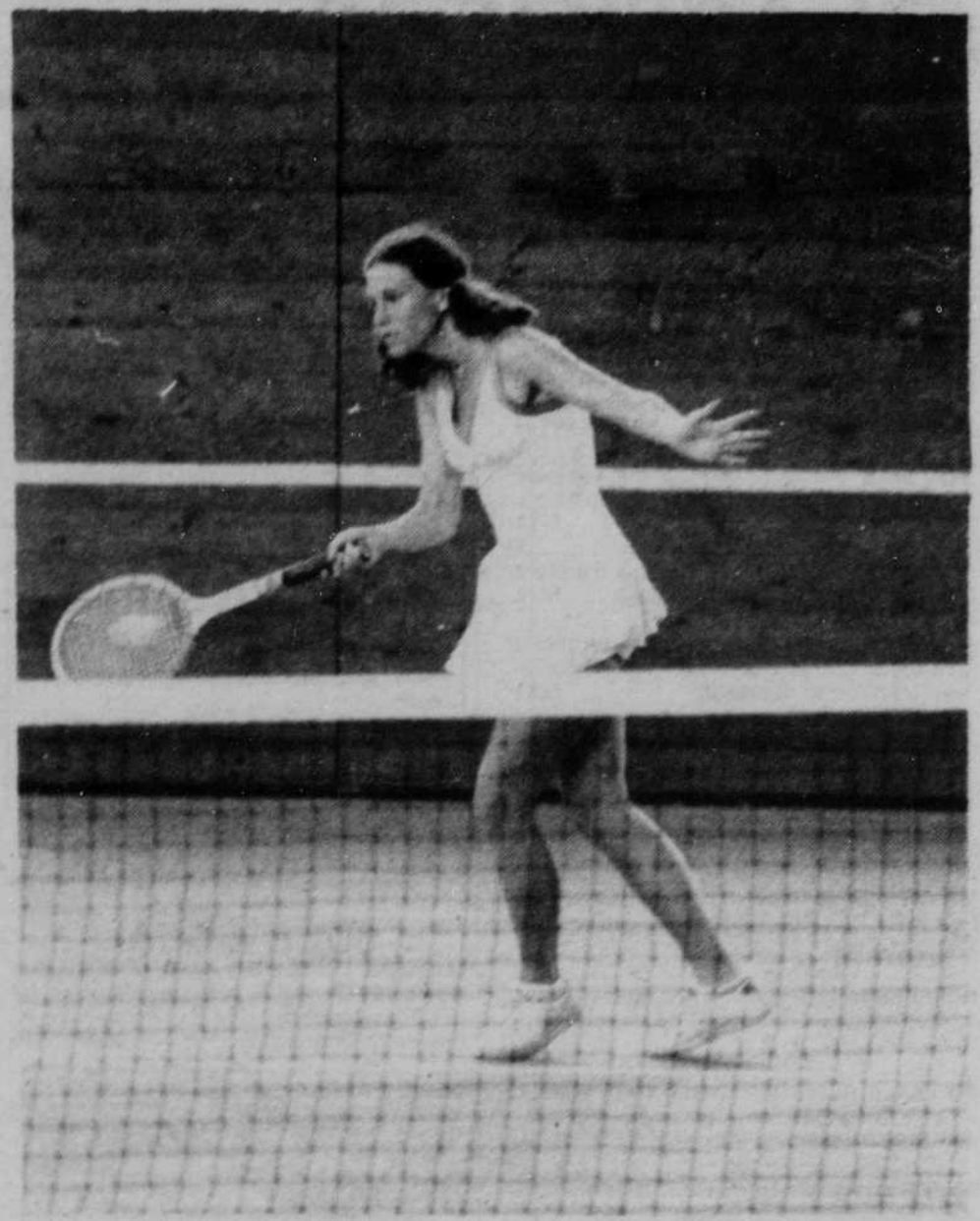
"They work really well together, very compatible," says Schey. "And they communicate well." She adds that finding the right doubles combinations "takes a lot of thought, evaluating the players and their skills."

Oregon has a few minor injuries. Nicholson will be playing with a sore foot and McKenna has an injured shoulder and foot. "She (McKenna) turned her foot against the University of Puget Sound on Friday," says Schey. "So that is a little tender."

Oregon will also have to contend with the slow courts at Corvallis. "I think we can adjust to them, once they start warming up with their opponent," says the coach.

The Ducks will enter the regionals with an overall record of 10-6 and 10-3 in the Northwest after a six-match winning streak.

Schey says she knows her squad will have plenty of determination at the regionals. "They are really fighters. They don't give up."
