

Yugoslav to speak today

Svetozar Stojanovic, a leading Yugoslavian social scientist, will speak on "Authoritarian and Democratic Communism" today at 3 p.m. in 167, EMU.

Stojanovic is former chairer of the sociology and philosophy department of the University of Belgrade and is one of the so-called "Belgrade Eight" professors dismissed from their teaching posts for political reasons.

Among his many publications is "Between Myth and Reality," a work critical of the role the state plays in the Yugoslavian system of self-management.

He has been a visiting professor at several European and American universities and is currently a visiting professor at the University of Texas.

His University visit is sponsored by the departments of sociology, philosophy and political science, the Russian and Eastern European Studies Center, the Center for Educational Policy and Management, and the Assembly and Lectures Committee.

SUAB mulls 'kill clause'

The Student University Affairs Board will discuss the University Assembly's "kill clause" today at 3:30 p.m. in Room 337 EMU.

The clause, which was approved by the assembly faculty members when creating the student positions, permits the governing body to vote out student members.

The board has discussed

whether it should withdraw a motion that requests review of the clause. The board tabled the discussion last week after deciding to ask University Pres. William Boyd for his opinion.

The board will also fill its chairer and vice chairer positions from a candidate field of five.

Nominated for chairer are Jess Barton, Carrie Winegar, Mike Haddock and Mike Johnston. Nominations for vice chairer include ElRay Cook, Barton and Winegar.

Doctor to head health center starting July

Dr. James Jackson, 31, currently on the staff of the Washington State University health center in Pullman, has been named medical director of the University Student Health Center.

Jackson will head a staff of eight full-time physicians in addition to consultants in psychiatry, gynecology, radiology and internal medicine. The University center is a modern, 40-bed facility with out-patient, pharmacy, laboratory, x-ray and physical therapy services.

The appointment is effective July 1.

Jackson, at WSU since 1977, also taught introduction to clinical medicine in the Washington Alaska Montana Idaho regional medical program. Students at WSU and nearby University of Idaho are among the participants in the program which is headquartered at the University of Washington.

Before going to WSU, he was a surgeon with the Public Health Service's Indian Health Service and was clinical director for the Family Practice Clinic at the Spokane Indian Reservation.

A runner who has completed 18 marathons, Jackson has interests in sports medicine.

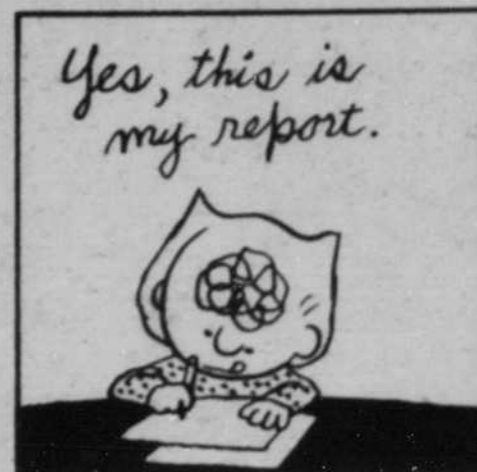
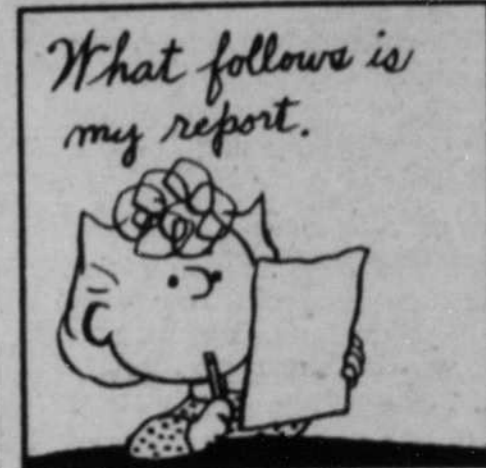
File workshop planned
