

## Migrant conference set

A regional conference on migrant education will be held Thursday and Friday at the University, sponsored by the High School Equivalency Program.

Entitled "Children of the Sun... The Future of the Migrant Student," the conference will feature workshops, a cultural night, campus tours and conference evaluation. Registration will be 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Thursday and 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. Friday at Emerald Hall.

Students' families, agency people and others interested have been invited to attend the conference to share information and resources. "Our goal is to provide a common ground for discussion of the future of migrant students," HEP Director James Romero says.

"Originally we planned to have an open house to let agency people and others see the improvements that have been made in the HEP program in the last two or three years," Romero explained, adding that the staff suggested the open house be combined with workshops and discussion.

At 3:30 p.m. Friday, the artists will formally present their entries to the judging committee. The public is invited, and comments will be welcomed by the committee. Following the presentations, the committee will choose the artist to be commissioned.

## Bus president to visit campus

William Niskanen, president of Pacific Trailways busline, will serve as executive-in-residence at the University College of Business Administration this month.

The head of the family-owned bus line will be on campus today to speak to management and transportation classes and to meet with master of business administration students and faculty.

Niskanen will also be guest speaker this evening for the annual banquet of Beta Gamma Sigma, the national business honorary.

The son of Finnish immigrants to Oregon, Niskanen entered the bus business in 1931 when he bought one-third interest in Mt. Hood Stages, which now does business under the name of Pacific Trailways. The company has 150 employees, with bus routes that link Portland and the Willamette Valley to central and eastern Oregon as well as Boise, Idaho, and Salt Lake City.

The executive program, initiated last year, is intended to give students a chance to learn face to face how businesses operate, says the program's coordinator, management Prof. Kenneth Ramsing.
