

## Senate to meet today

The University Senate will entertain three items of business, including one motion that would change the requirements students must meet for a bachelor's degree, when it meets at 3:30 p.m. today in 229 Law.

History Prof. Robert Berdahl's motion asks that math requirements for the Bachelor of Science degree be changed, and that present group-satisfying courses expire fall term, 1981. During the 1979-80 academic year the College of Arts and Sciences would provide lists of proposed group-satisfying courses to the University Curriculum Committee, which would bring the proposals to a vote of the University Assembly by the June 1980 meeting.

The proposal also advises that the present structure of group requirements be revised to form three groups: literary and artistic studies and expressive and communicative studies, historical and social studies, and mathematical and symbolic sciences and natural sciences.

Students in professional schools and colleges, under the proposal, would be required to take a certain number of courses from each group, as would students in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Also on the agenda is a motion requiring all instructors to submit course descriptions to the ASUO Guide for courses numbered 50-499 during each fall, winter and spring term beginning next fall term.

Discussion will continue from last month's meeting of Linguistic Prof. Dale Sloat's motion providing for a new review process to withdraw experimental courses from the curriculum if they duplicate already established courses.

## Board needs students for two-year term

Applications and nominations are now being taken for a two-year term on the State Board of Higher Education.

Board member duties include bi-monthly committee and full board meetings. Committees include the Committee on Instruction, Research and Public Service programs and the Committee on Finance, Administration and the Physical Plant. Committees review proposals and make recommendations to the full board.

Interested undergraduate or graduate students can apply for the position by sending a resume and a cover letter to Shirley Woodrow, special assistant to the governor for executive appointments, 254 State Capitol, Salem. Nominations should include a resume and a cover letter.

Applications and nominations are due Friday. Gov. Vic Atiyeh is expected to make the appointment by the end of June.

## Art catalog available for donated works

A definitive catalog of the collected works of distinguished Oregon etcher and architect Louis Rosenberg is now available from the University library.

Born and raised in Portland, Rosenberg became well known for his etchings in the late '20s and worked in that medium until its popularity declined in the mid '40s.

His career as an architect — undertaken both in Portland and in New York City — also brought him distinction. Among his many awards and prizes was the Gold Fine Arts Medal of the American Institute of Architects.

In 1969 Rosenberg gave the major portion of his personal collection of matted etchings and dry points to the University library. An additional gift of framed etchings, dry points, watercolors, journals, catalogs, architectural renderings, his personal library and awards was made in 1977.

The new volume catalogs these two gifts and contains information from interviews with Rosenberg who, at 89, lives in Oregon City. The volume was prepared by Gail McMillian, administrative assistant in special collections.

## Alumni magazine wins

The University's quarterly alumni magazine has received an Exceptional Achievement Award in Council for Advancement and Support of Education judging, placing it among the top 10 entries in the national competition.

Old Oregon, edited by Barbara Edwards, was judged with more than 100 other alumni magazines for content, quality of writing, visual communication and effectiveness.

The publication is sent to 58,000 alumni and friends of the University throughout Oregon, the United States and the world.

Edwards holds a bachelor's degree in English and a master's degree in journalism from the University. The magazine was designed by Jim Bodoh, publication designer currently on educational leave from the University Publications Office.

Old Oregon was in the top 30 of about 130 entries last year.

Feature articles on public affairs issues written by the new director of the University News Bureau, Barbara Petura, were included in another alumni publication honored.
