

If center staff have violated the regulations, she said, CSD then could give them a warning or notice of weekly inspection to verify that the problem has been corrected. CSD also has the power to suspend a center's license, she adds, though it has never been done before.

McCoy says that during Tuesday's surprise visit she was informed by one of the aides that the staff had been notified of the medication-permission regulation at a recent meeting.

"I am a little concerned that it (information about the rule) had not been made more widespread," the CSD representative said.

Part of the problem, she said, is CCDC's high turnover rate of work-study personnel each

term. CSD only makes annual certification visits, McCoy said, so it is up to center staff to instruct new employees.

McCoy said that during her visit the infant house had a "fine staff ratio," the other issue Rapoport said needed investigation.

Rapoport had claimed there was insufficient and, at times, poorly trained personnel working at the infant house. This, she said, led to behavioral problems among the toddlers.

Venturacci denied the charges and said the center is "adequately staffed 95 percent of the time." The rest of the time, she said, it is only minutes before additional aides arrive.

"Melanie is trying to find everything she can to make the

center look bad," the director said.

Chapito said she didn't want to sound as if she were trying "to nail" anyone, as there had "been too much of that already."

"The staff are nice people. They obviously like kids," Chapito said. She just wants more responsiveness from the administration and teachers, she added.

"I just don't know what to say," Venturacci said in answer to the parents' comments. CCDC staff try to listen to parents and are constantly "self-policing" each other to correct any problems, she said.

"Look at the center. The kids here are happy and well adjusted."

The program will include a film entitled "Working for Your Life," a panel discussion by unionists, and special sections for production workers, health and child care workers and service an culinary workers.

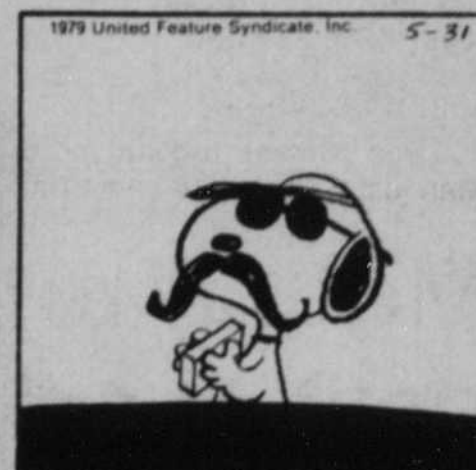

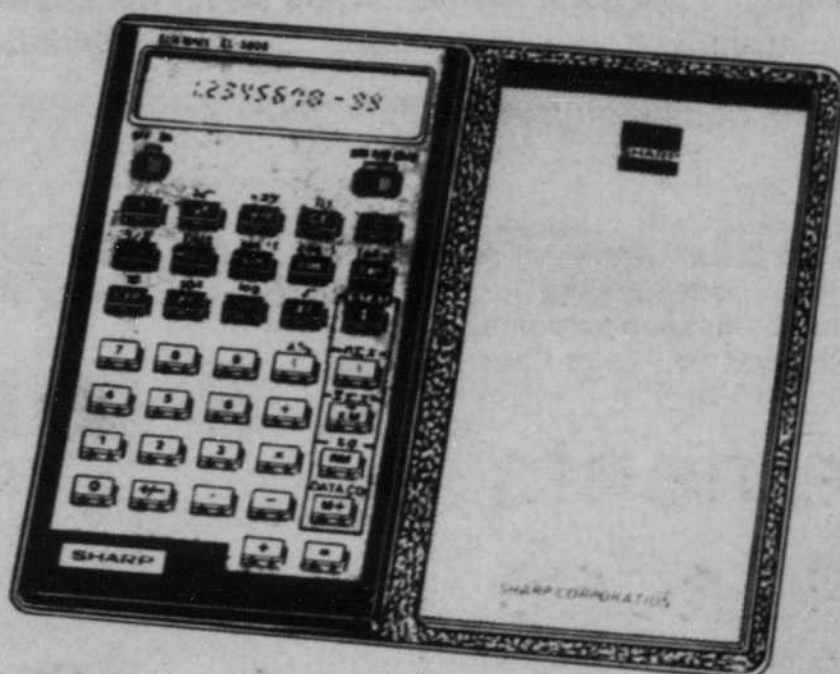
