

Noted women directors topic of summer class

Highly acclaimed feature films by women directors from five nations are the focus of a class community members may enroll in this summer, June 18-July 13, at the University.

The works of Lina Wertmuller, Agnes Varda, Barbara Kopple, Susan Sontag, Mai Zetterling and Ida Lupino will be included in the film series. Course lectures will show how the films represent a wide range of issues and genre.

Lecture times will be 12:30-2 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays, in 216 Allen. Screenings will be at 7:30 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays, in 180 PLC.

The three-credit, eight-week course costs \$86.50. Former University Community Education students may take the course for \$67. Fees are due the day of registration. In addition to the University summer session registration fee, there is an \$8 cost for all the films. Showings are open to the public and tickets will be available at the door for \$1.25.

Enrollment is today McArthur Court; enrollment the rest of this week at the Registrar's Office, 220 Oregon Hall. Registration times are available in the Registrar's Office.

The films scheduled for this week are: tonight, "Cleo from Five to Seven," Agnes Varda, France, 1961 and Wednesday, "The Fruit of Paradise," Vera Chytilova, Czechoslovakia, 1970. Other films to be shown this term are: "The Night Porter," Liliana Cavani, Italy, 1974; "Swept Away," Lina Wertmuller, Italy, 1975; "Antonia: A Portrait of a Woman," Judy Collins, USA, 1974; "Harlan County," Barbara Kopple, USA, 1976, shown free; "The Student Nurses," Stephanie Rothman, USA, 1970; and "The Girls," Mai Zetterling, Sweden, 1967.

Solar equipment talk set

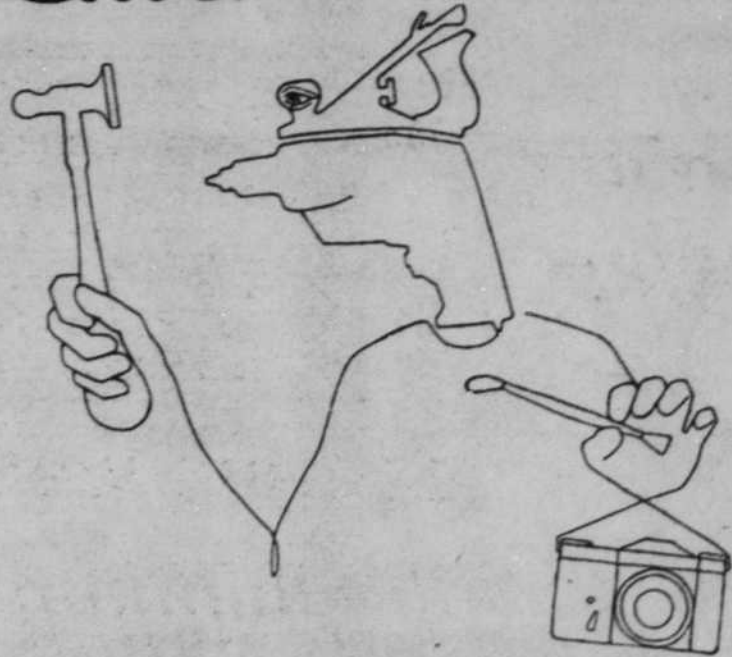

University groups elect members

Nearly two dozen individuals were elected to three University governing bodies — the Faculty Advisory Council, the Faculty Personnel Committee and the University Senate — in a recent faculty election conducted by mail.

The 25 newly elected council, committee and senate members will take office July 1. Their terms of office will expire in the spring of 1981.

Elected to the University's eight-member Faculty Advisory

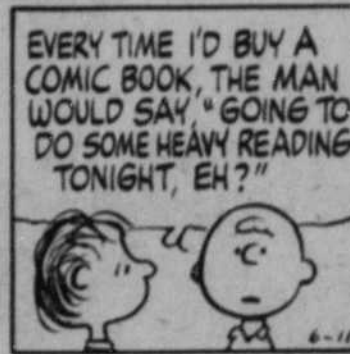
Council, responsible for providing counsel on university affairs to Pres. William Boyd, were Virgil Boekelheide, professor of chemistry; Robert Campbell, professor of economics; Mavis Mate, associate professor of history; and Donald Tull, professor of marketing.

Elected to the eight-member Faculty Personnel Committee, which conducts reviews and makes recommendations to the president on all promotion and tenure cases, were Jane Gray,

professor of biology; Perry Powers, professor of romance languages; Donald Van Houten, associate professor of sociology; and C.R.B. Wright, professor of mathematics.

In the election, 17 new members were chosen for the faculty-student University Senate, which has 54 members and is charged with reviewing and making recommendations on legislation to be submitted to the faculty-student governing body, the University Assembly.

Geology building will get new surface

The south wall of the University Geology building will become something more than a plain surface this summer when a local artist decorates it with a basalt rock sculpture.

Steve Gillman of Eugene was selected from a field of 30 Northwest artists seeking commission to execute a major sculpture for the University.

A jury of various University personnel chose Gillman's entry, an integrated group of

polished slabs of basalt, for its sensitive and effective use of a material that is particularly appropriate to an earth science theme. Basalt, a rock of volcanic origin, is native to the Eugene area and a major object of study by the geology department.

Gillman says that his sculpture, as a group of shapes that are "fitting yet disconnected," symbolizes the fragmentary nature of geological evidence such as found in excavations of animal skeletons.

Gillman earned a master of fine arts degree in sculpture from the University in 1976. He has taught at Lane Community College and currently has an exhibition of his work at the Vorpall Gallery in San Francisco.

Funds for the art work were appropriated in 1962, shortly after the building was completed. The source of funds was an unrestricted gift from Flora Ward, received by the University in the 1930s.
