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House eyes draft registration

The U.S. House of Representatives is expected to vote on a defense department bill regarding the draft by the end of this week. The appropriations bill includes provisions calling for the registration of 18-year-old males for the draft beginning January, 1981.

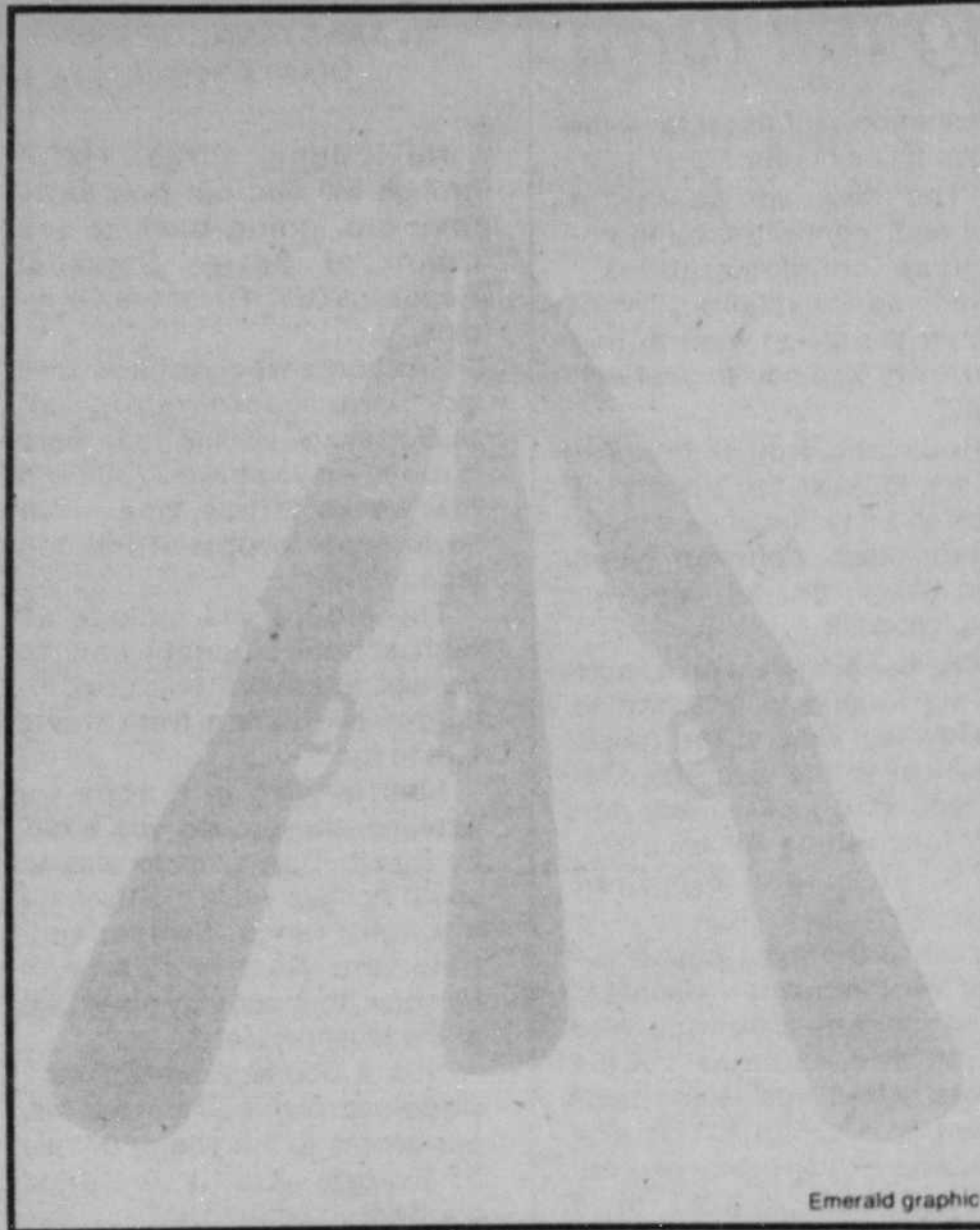
Dave Fidanque, aide to Rep. Jim Weaver, D-Ore., outlined legislative action on the bill, HB 4040, during a press conference called by the Coalition Opposing Registration and the Draft (CORD) late last week.

According to Fidanque, the bill, in addition to the draft registration provisions, also asks Pres. Jimmy Carter to report back to Congress on the feasibility of registering and drafting women, whether to repeal the privacy act to secure citizens' records to aid in registration and whether the president has the power to begin draft registration.

"The study won't carry much weight in Congress but it will keep the issue alive," Fidanque said.

Weaver and other representatives opposed to draft registration will try to strike the registration provisions from the bill, Fidanque said.

"We'd like to strike the study provisions as well, but realis-

tically I don't think we can," he added.

Dave Isenberg, a member of CORD, said draft registration obviously leads to the draft and is tied in with foreign policy.

"There's a lot more to the plans for draft registration than a list of names," he said, adding that the military is building up for intervention in the Middle East to secure oil supplies.

Among Isenberg's examples of military escalation are the recall of 4,060 retired army personnel, plans to recall military doctors and veterans, and the creation of a "unilateral strike force" of 100,000 soldiers for "trouble spots other than Western Europe."

Fidanque said the recent military build-up has Weaver concerned, especially in light of the oil crisis.

"There is no way militarily to secure the oil supply in the Middle East," he said. "We're going to have to cut back on our consumption or they will do it for us."

Fidanque said draft registration is unnecessary at this time.

"The issue is whether the selective service will have the capabilities to get organized," he said. "Registration isn't going to do that."

The Senate is waiting to see how the House vote goes on HB 4040 before it votes on a Senate bill that would register 18- to 26-year-old males beginning in January, Fidanque said.

"That bill has no chance in the House," he predicted.

CORD representatives also announced that a "Community Forum on the Draft" will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Aug. 9 at Harris Hall. The forum is sponsored by CORD and the Willamette Valley Observer.

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Rent petition lacks names

Nearly 2,000 people have signed a petition in favor of rent control in Eugene, but unless 4,000 more signatures are collected, the charter amendment for rent control won't make the November election ballot.

Michael Shelly, who co-wrote the amendment and is leading the pro-rent control forces, says that rent control will affect a large number of Eugeneans, and hopes that it will spur active involvement with the petition. The number of people who show up at a Wednesday evening meeting will determine the importance of the issue, he adds.

He is hoping for better community response and active involvement on the rent control issue.

If the charter amendment is passed by the voters in November, it will:

- Limit a tenant's deposit to three-quarters of the rent, and eliminate a "last month" rent deposit.
- Prohibit non-refundable deposits or fees (except a \$35 pet fee), and return the excess to the tenant within a month of the amendment's passage. Landlords would be required to give a tenant 60 days' notice before eviction without legal cause.
- Limit how much a landlord can raise a tenant's rent per year.
- Provide for a legal authority that can render judgments, levy fines and award damages dealing with tenant complaints.
- Allow the landlord to raise

the rent up to 20 percent if increased costs can be "documented."

- Require landlords to register units, including costs and rent, on February 1, 1979, in order to keep a record of rent changes.

Shelly, whose family works in real estate, has been involved with Eugene housing advocacy issues for the past three years. He works at the Family Shelter House in Eugene.

He has been called "idealistic and unaware" on some housing issues, but he says, "I have been on both sides of the fence and I thought and still believe I have objective views."

The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the south room of Harris Hall in the Public Service Building, 125 E. 8th St.

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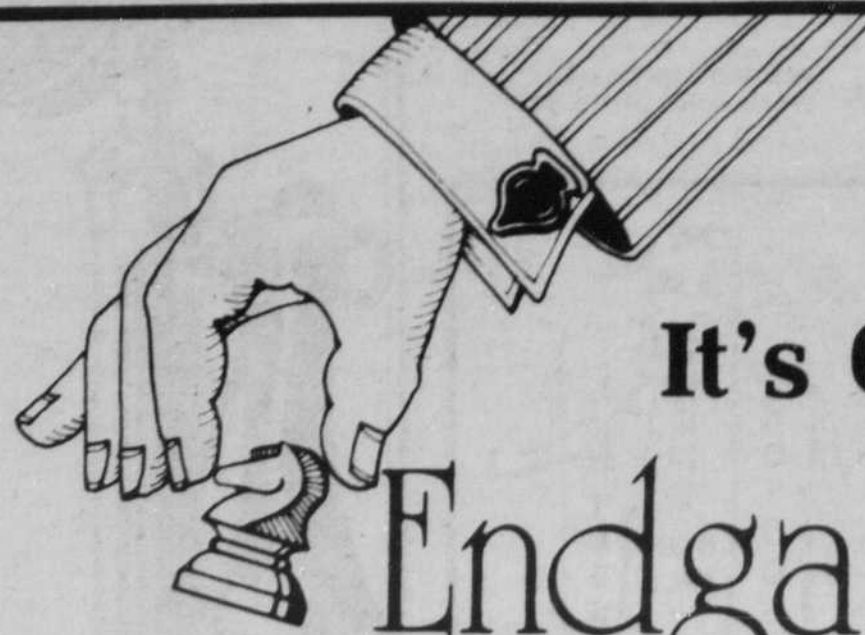
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
