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Instructors take biggest slice of the University's tuition pie

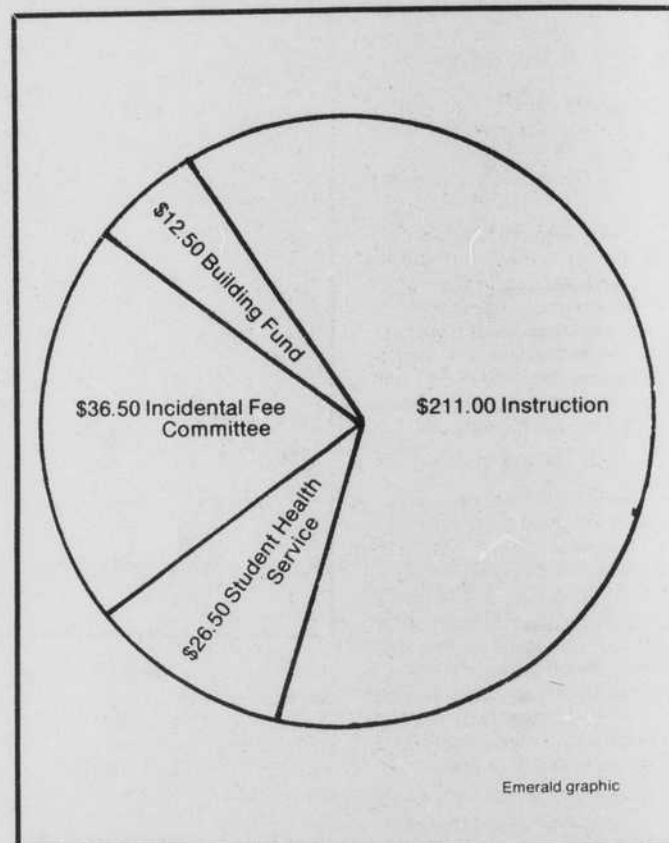

Bare light bulbs hang over the registrar's cages as students shuffle slowly in winding lines, obediently waiting their turn to pay tuition and fees. During the year, students funnel more than \$12 million into the University coffers through tuition and fees.

Currently, full-time students pay a total tuition of \$286.50 per term if they're resident undergraduates and \$994.50 if they're non-resident undergraduates. Graduate residents pay \$431.50 and non-resident graduates pay \$736.50 per term in total tuition.

Many students are concerned with how much tuition costs, but the University is concerned with where the money goes and how it's spent.

The biggest chunk goes toward instruction costs. Resident undergraduates pay \$211 each term for instruction and resident graduates pay \$356. Nonresident undergraduates pay the highest teaching costs, \$919, and nonresident graduates pay \$661.

The difference between resident and nonresident instructional fees are percentages: Resident undergraduates pay 23 percent of the costs while nonresident undergraduates pay 100 percent.

Tacked on to tuition are mandatory health, building and incidental fees. Every student pays a \$12.50 building fee, a \$26.50 health fee and \$36.50 in incidental fees.

Health fees enable students to use the Student Health Center for general medical attention and treatment. Students are charged only for special services such as immunization,

prescriptions, X-rays and lab fees. Students can also receive 15 days of free hospitalization in the infirmary.

Incidental fees are used to support student programs and

services. Included are ASUO programs and governance, operation and services of the EMU, student athletic passes, sports, Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group, Oregon Student Lobby and student subscriptions to the Oregon Daily Emerald.

Building fees are applied to building maintenance and use of building facilities.

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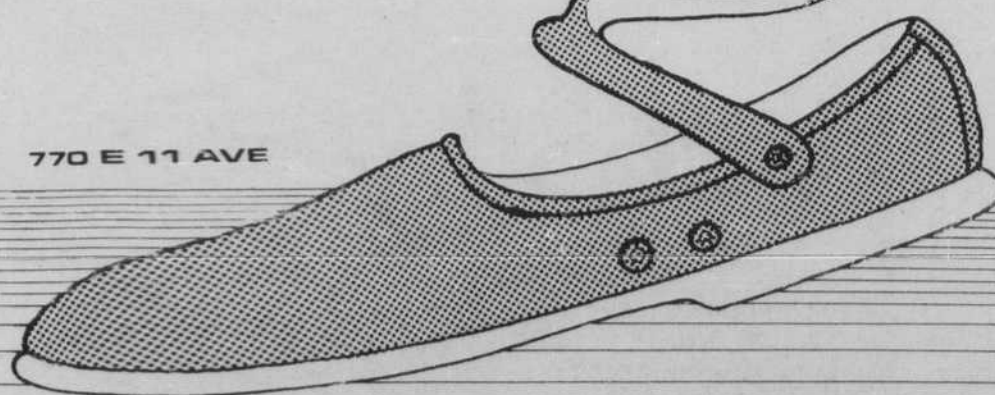
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
