

Registration figures show enrollment rise

The number of students filing registration materials to attend the University was up about three percent at the close of Mac Court registration, according to Registrar Wanda Johnson.

A total of 12,273 students filed materials during the two-day registration, compared to 11,994 last year, Johnson says. Enrollment increases in the Community Education Program and School of Law, plus an increase in the number of freshmen participating in the Early Orientation and Registration Program, brought the figure to 14,981 at the end of last week. This compares with 14,499 in 1978.

"The enrollment picture is very, very encouraging," Johnson said Monday. "While we don't have a complete breakdown of undergraduate versus graduate enrollment at this time, undergraduate enroll-

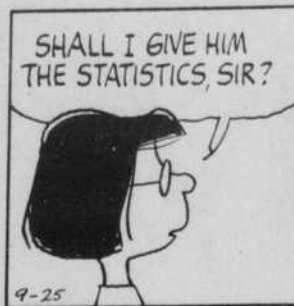
ment appears to be up about three percent."

Another 2,000 or more students are expected to file materials during the registration period which extends into October. University students may enroll through Wednesday without paying a penalty and may enroll as late as Oct. 5 without having to petition.

The largest percentage increase — 22.7 percent — was in the Community Education Program, which enrolled 628 students compared with 512 last year, Johnson says. The program allows community members to take regular University courses at reduced costs without formal admissions procedures.

Freshmen taking advantage of EORP during the summer totaled 1,562, up from 1,485 last year. Enrollment in the School of Law this fall is 518, compared to 508 last year.

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Campus gallery opens exhibit for fall term

Gallery 141, the fine arts department's gallery in 141 Lawrence, has opened its exhibition season for the 1979-80 school year.

The first exhibition of the year is a multi-media showing of recent works by the members of the fine arts faculty at the University. Keep record of tax rebate

Taxpayers may want to record the amount of the income tax rebate checks they receive from the Oregon Department of Revenue. The information may be needed next spring for filing federal tax returns.

The rebates are not taxable by Oregon. However, they may be taxable income for some federal taxpayers. Those persons who itemized deductions on their 1978 federal returns and deducted the state tax paid must add the amount of the rebate back into their 1979 income.

The rebates, which amount to 9 percent of an individual's 1978 state income tax, are part of the 1979 Oregon Legislature's tax relief plan.

People's law classes set

The People's Law School will hold its first class of the year Wednesday evening. The class will be an introduction to the procedures for getting legal advice, and how to determine situations where a lawyer is needed. These classes are taught by University law students, and will be held every Wednesday from 7-9 p.m. in the Lincoln Community School cafeteria.

Lists of community resources will be available, detailing alternative ways of dealing with legal matters. Suggestions will be given on how to find a lawyer best suited for the type of work needed, fees, what lawyers are available and possible action in case the client is dissatisfied with a lawyer's work or fee.

Titles of some of the classes planned for future weeks include "Being a Tenant," "Small Claims Court" and "Wills."

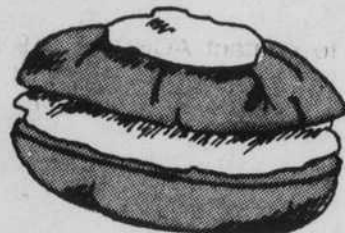
