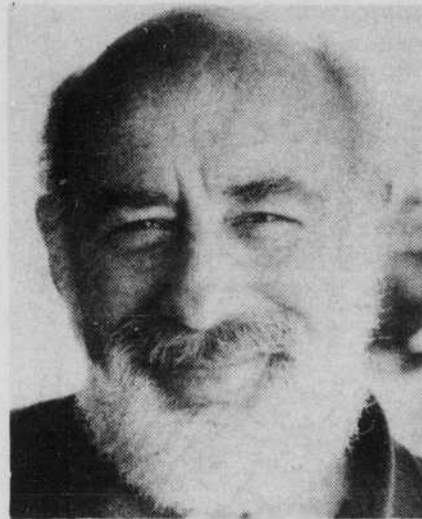

Energy future stirs debate

Oregonians looking for an alternative to the possible federal administration of power in the state are striving to maintain local control over energy decisions.

Almost 10 People's Utility District support committees around the state are pushing for PUDs as the Oregon option to avoiding a federal solution that emphasizes coal and nuclear power plants and a "czar-like" federal control over regional power, says John Stewart, vice chairer of the county's Democratic Party.

At the Monday Demo Forum, Stewart said people are stepping forth on their own to implement an energy plan, rejecting a possible federal solution to meet growing energy demands.

The possible federal solution is a Northwest regional power bill now being considered by the House. The bill passed the Senate on a voice vote.

Opponents of SB 885 say it would give the Bonneville Power Administration control over regional energy decisions.

They say the bill also places emphasis on coal and nuclear power.

Proponents maintain that an energy council made up of the governors of Oregon, Montana, Idaho and Washington and the BPA administrator should make regional energy decisions.

Senate amendments to the bill mandate that renewable resources and biomass be studied for cost-effectiveness before nuclear power is considered, proponents say.

All agree that some form of energy legislation is needed to avoid the chaos that will result when BPA's contracts with public and private utilities and direct service industries begin to expire in 1981.

BPA's power allocation guidelines now contain a preference clause that gives public utilities first crack at cheap hydroelectric power. Without legislation, power allocation decisions may end up in the courts with utilities and industry vying for the less expensive power.

The energy future of this

region is tied to the way Congress acts on this bill, Stewart said. The public faces the question as to what role the state assumes, he added.

He presented results of a 1978 poll conducted by Bardsley & Haslacher of Portland for Pacific Power & Light Co. that shows 48 percent of PP&L customers wanted to switch to a PUD, 29 percent were opposed and 23 percent were undecided.

The poll also showed that 47 percent of Portland General Electric Co. customers wanted to switch to a PUD, 20 percent were opposed and 33 percent were undecided.

Stewart presented other figures that he said showed economic reasons at the root of the majority's support. The majority of those opposed to a PUD gave a lack of information as their reason for opposition.

Stewart said if one-third of undecided voters and voters with a lack of information could be swayed to support PUDs, then PGE and PP&L could be replaced by PUDs in the 1980 elections.

Efforts to form PUDs follows 1979 state legislative action streamlining procedures for forming PUDs, Stewart said.

Oregonians for Utility Reform in Portland have begun a push for initiatives that would allow a state energy development commission to focus energy development plans on hydroelectric power and renewable resources and to place a moratorium on construction of nuclear power plants, he said.
