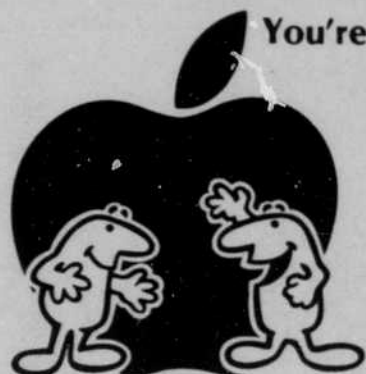

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Candy sale aids charity

The Kidney Association of Oregon is opening its 1979 statewide sale of Halloween "Trick or Treat" candy to raise funds for a portion of the cost of dialysis for Oregonians suffering from kidney failure.

The association is appealing to individuals, civic groups, schools, veterans, businesses, churches, youth groups, and men and women's clubs to come to its aid by helping to sell the Halloween candy during the annual fund-raising event.

Chuck Foster, KAO executive director, said, "Dozens of organizations and community groups around the state every year place orders for the candy, but in order to raise as much money as possible for our patients, we need the help of more groups."

The Halloween packages contain 20 Sherbits candy 5-flavor rolls, boxed and cellophane-wrapped with 30 boxes in each case. The Kidney Association label on the box identifies the candy, and each box sells for \$2. If possible, people are asked to order in units of complete cases in order to facilitate handling.

"Most families," Foster says, "will buy a supply of Halloween candy from some source for 'Trick or Treat' goblins, anyway. We would appreciate people buying their candy from KAO and thereby helping to save lives."
