

Women harriers face UCLA

The University women's cross country team will fly to Los Angeles today to participate in the Bruin Invitational at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon.

The meet will be run on the UCLA athletic fields and will feature teams from Oregon, UCLA, San Diego State, and Cal State-Long Beach.

Coach Tom Heinonen says there may be a couple of good runners from UCLA and Arizona State University but otherwise it looks like it might be all Ducks. "There are no teams that should be able to give us any trouble at all," he says.

Kathy Mintie of ASU was runner-up in the 5,000 meters at the AIAW track championships last year, just ahead of the Ducks' Jody Parker. "She ran some incredibly good road races this summer. She looks like she's at the top of her form right now," says Heinonen.

Michelle Bush, a freshman at UCLA, was seventh in the national Bonne Belle 10,000 meter race in Boston and was very highly recruited last year.

Heinonen says the Ducks will have to watch out for those two and adds that the meet is an

important one because his team needs a good tuneup before nationals.

"We need to break those two up to win the meet," he says. "I look for UCLA to be a strong test for us and we need that because

we may not get another one till nationals."

Oregon will enter Parker, Cheri Williams, Eryn Forbes, Leann Warren, Katy Mountain, Joan Hopfenspirger and Molly Morton.

Berry's hat trick leads Ducks

Nancy Berry scored three straight goals for the Ducks to lead the Oregon women's field hockey team to a 6-0 victory over the Oregon College of Education Wednesday night, at Autzen Stadium. The Ducks,

now fourteenth-ranked nationally, upped their season record to 13-1-1, while nailing down their eleventh shutout in 15 games.

Berry, a senior outside from Fremont, Calif., scored her first goal seconds before the first half ended, giving Oregon a 4-0

halftime advantage. She then tallied twice more during the final five minutes of the game. Berry now leads the team in goals this season with 16.

The Ducks were dominant in the game right from the start. Senior outside Nancy Pedrotti scored Oregon's first goal only two minutes into the game. Pedrotti later added a pair of assists to aid a persistent Oregon passing attack. The Ducks out-shot OCE 28-1 and had a 27-4 advantage in penalty corners. However, Oregon's shooting percentage was rather poor (only 6-28), but this can be attributed to "the good job" turned in by OCE's goalie, and also the fact that Oregon was up against a 10-player defense.

"I think we could have played a lot better," said Berry. "We made some mistakes, but everybody played pretty well."

Oregon gets a well-needed rest, not playing a game until Oct. 26 when the team travels to California for the Berkeley Invitational. The Ducks will use that time to heal their wounded players and to concentrate on getting down the finer points of the game.

Pirates clinch series on Stargell's homer

BALTIMORE — Remarkable Willie Stargell cracked a game-winning two-run homer Wednesday night to give Pittsburgh a 4-1 triumph over the Baltimore Orioles and make the Pirates only the fourth team to overcome a 3-1 game deficit and take a best-of-seven World Series.

Stargell known affectionately as "Pops" by the rest of the Pirates, put the third of his four hits for the night over his team's bullpen in the sixth inning.

Stargell unloaded against

left-hander Scott McGregor, who pitched a courageous game in defeat for the Orioles.

In the ninth, Pittsburgh added two wrapup runs, against a parade of five Baltimore relief pitchers.

Phil Garner opened with a double to left — his 12th hit of the Series — and scored on Omar Moreno's third hit of the game.

A single by Tim Lincecum moved Moreno to third and then Dave Parker and Bill Robinson were hit by pitches, forcing home the final Pirates run.
