

Jail head receives positive feedback from national corrections directors

The new Lane County Jail deserves some favorable reviews, according to members of the Adult Corrections Advisory Committee, and they think they've found a way to generate some "good news."

Two weeks ago 70 jail administrators from across the country, met in Eugene for the National Jail Managers Conference and toured the county's new jail facility. Capt. Paul Bailey, county jail director, told the committee that he received "very positive feedback" from the administrators.

According to Bailey and John Clague, training officer for the

jail, the administrators were impressed with nearly every aspect of the new prison especially the medical, kitchen and library facilities.

Committee chairer John Wilson, seizing the moment to voice his aggravation over the poor media reviews of a "very good (jail) program and excellent staff," recommended that a questionnaire be sent to each of the 70 administrators asking for their impressions of the local jail.

The committee unanimously approved the motion and decided to publicly release the results of the questionnaires.

The members of the committee were confident the results would offset much of the negative publicity the new jail and its director have received since it opened last April. The jail has suffered from chronic overcrowding problems and Capt. Bailey was temporarily relieved of his duties following a jail mini-riot last June in which he allegedly assaulted an inmate.

Committee member Al Stockstad saw one possible problem with the questionnaire. "I sure hope we didn't give them (the administrators) any coffee," he said while setting his cup on the table.

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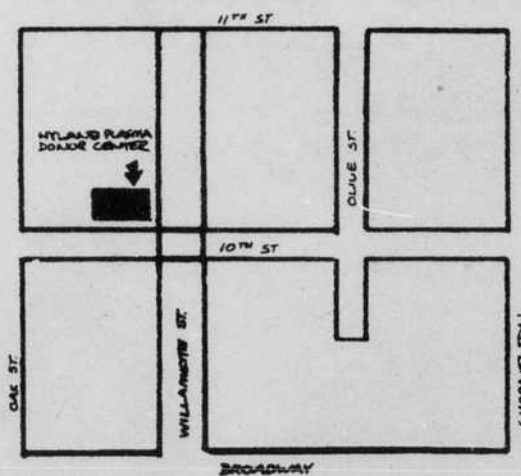


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MEETINGS
