

Drug center discovers bogus 'speed'

Students who purchase amphetamines or "speed" on the illegal drug market to stay awake on the job or in the classroom are getting less than they bargained for, according to a warning issued Wednesday by the University's Drug Information Center.

Center director Mark Miller said chemical analysis of samples submitted to the center's contract laboratory show the suspect products contain varying amounts of ephedrine, a stimulant used primarily to relieve nasal congestion.

Those who purchase products that allegedly contain amphetamine or speed should be aware that ephedrine is a much less potent stimulant," Miller stressed. "Truck drivers, students, swing-shift workers and others should not count on the bogus product to maintain wakefulness and alertness."

Miller also said four products in particular have been marketed falsely as amphetamines. Most prominent are black capsules without markings known as "black beauties" or "Big B's" and black-and-red capsules called "30-30's".

Tests also show that small, yellow tablets that are cross-scored, and small, heart shaped, pink tablets with single score contain only ephedrine.

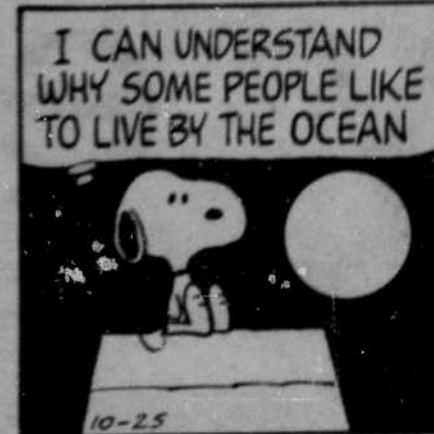
Togas, sailor suits, armor and circus clothes will go on sale next week at the University Theatre.
