

Ford to visit University Nov. 14 peanuts®

A public address at Mac Court will highlight the University visit of former Pres. Gerald Ford Nov. 14.

The address, open to the public without charge, is scheduled for 10 a.m. Ford is expected to discuss current economic and social issues.

High schools throughout Lane County have been invited to bring students in government and civics classes to the address, according to Curtis Simic, vice president for public services. Early response to the invitation indicate the address will attract more than 600 high school students.

"We've tried to give all seg-

ments of the community an opportunity to see and hear Ford," said Simic, whose staff is handling arrangements for the Ford visit.

The one-day visit will begin with a reception for University faculty and staff at 8:30 a.m. at

the EMU. Following Ford's public address, there will be a news conference for the media at Straub Hall.

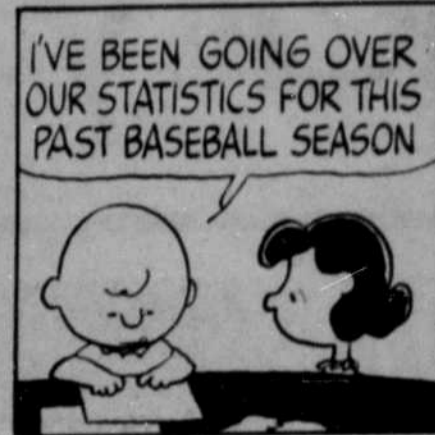
The former president will meet with local government and student leaders during a luncheon.

Simons predicts more ballots

Mylene Simons, ASUO vice president for University and State affairs, says she expects more students to vote in the ASUO general elections this week than voted in last week's primaries.

Fewer than 900 people voted in the primaries, a drop from the 990 who cast primary ballots last year.

The ASUO is sponsoring a candidates' forum today at 1 p.m. in the EMU Fishbowl. All 14 Incidental Fee committee candidates and eight Student University Affairs Board candidates will give short statements and answer questions from the floor.
