

Local trick or treat volunteers needed

Volunteer participation in the annual United Nation's Children Fund Trick or Treat campaign is especially important this year because of the desperate need for relief in Cambodia, according to local UNICEF representatives.

UNICEF, in addition to continuing its projects for 400 million children who lack the basic essentials of education, health and nutrition in many developing countries, has mounted a massive emergency relief program for refugees in Cambodia.

Working in cooperation with the International Committee of the Red Cross and the World

Food Program, UNICEF will provide an initial \$111 million in assistance to the Cambodian people during the next six months. More than half of the aid — \$69 million — is in food supplies and food transport costs with 6,000 tons of rice to be delivered by the end of October.

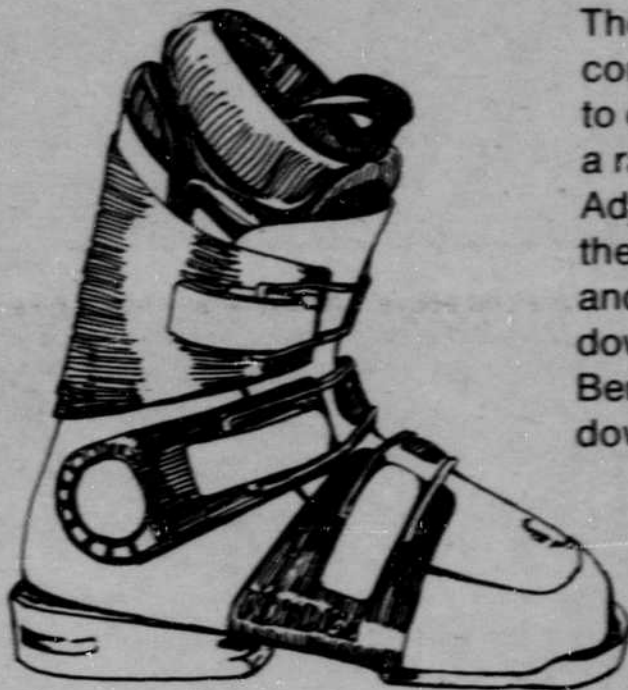
Current reports from Cambodia indicate that 80 to 90 percent of the children are suffering from malnutrition, many of them in severe stages. Malaria, anemia and problems caused by intestinal parasites are also widespread. The few existing medical facilities are

without even the most basic drug supplies and medical personnel are extremely scarce with only 55 doctors still in the country.

In addition to the Trick or Treat program, volunteers are needed to plan fund raisers and get educational materials and instructions to children in the community.
