

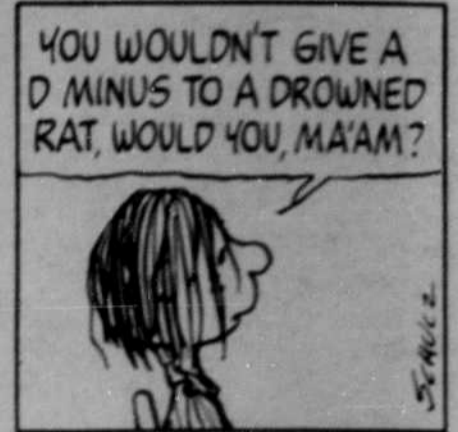
## Speech team wins sweepstake award

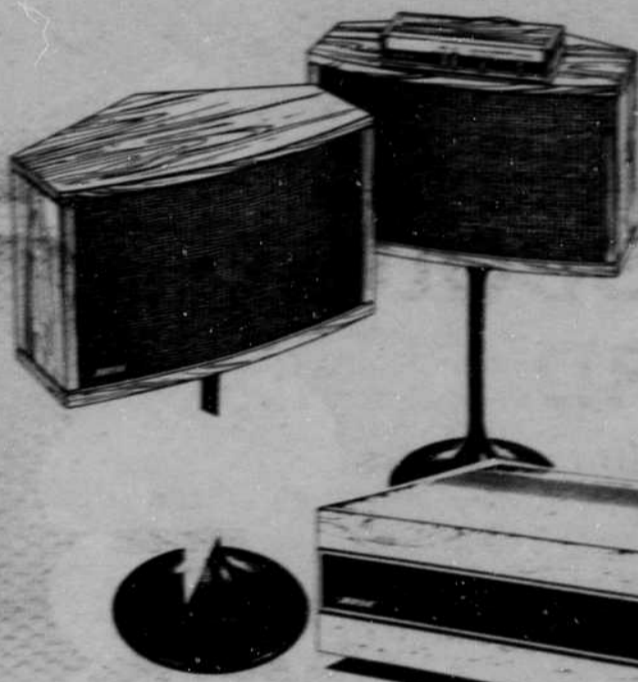

## Peace Corps, VISTA seek help

Representatives for the Peace Corps and VISTA will be at the University through Friday to seek volunteers to join in the struggle against poverty around the world.

"The war on poverty is not over, and the Peace Corps and VISTA are looking for reinforcements to carry on what other volunteers have begun," says Betsy Hyde, former Peace Corps volunteer to Africa and presently a recruiting representative for the all-volunteer programs.

"We're looking for people who want to be in the forefront of effecting change," she says. "If you care about people, don't mind working for subsistence wages, and can overcome frustration and cultural differences,

we want to talk to you - and it helps to have a taste for adventure."

An information booth will be set up in the EMU from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Individual interviews can be scheduled on the same days through the Career Planning and Placement Office. Students are asked to sign-up in advance for the interviews.

The four-day recruiting effort will include a special seminar on Peace Corps and VISTA opportunities, scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the EMU. The seminar is open to the public.

Hyde says there are approximately 10,000 Peace Corps and VISTA volunteers serving at home and overseas. "We can accept applications up to a year away," she says.
