

Foundation receives aid

A scholarship fund honoring the late Lucien Arant, long-time Oregon newspaper publisher, has been established at the University.

The Lucien P. Arant Memorial Fund was established with a bequest of approximately \$350,000 to the University of Oregon Foundation from his wife, the late Mamie Cuning Arant. The fund will provide scholarships to University students preferably but not necessarily enrolled in journalism.

Born in Monmouth, Ore., in 1895, Arant studied journalism and economics at the University from 1914 to 1918, then went on to Portland to work for the Oregon Journal and then the Oregonian.

In 1925, he and the late Bernard Mainwaring bought and co-published the Baker Evening Herald which they merged with

the Baker Democrat four years later. The two also jointly purchased the Nampa Free Press in 1937.

Arant, who was president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association in 1952, retired from publishing in 1957 and served for six years as an officer of the Arizona-California Investment Fund. He died in 1964.

In an interview some years before her death in 1978, Mrs. Arant recalled that her husband often came to Eugene for ONPA meetings "and expressed a desire to assist University students on the basis of merit."

The Arant memorial fund is the second major scholarship endowment for journalism students to be established at the University this fall. The creation of the Arlyn Cole Scholarships,

funded by a \$1 million bequest, was announced in September.

"These two major scholarship funds should enable us to attract and hold outstanding students at both the undergraduate and graduate level," says Galen Rarick, dean of the University school of journalism.

Many of the earlier scholarships were restricted to Oregon residents, and the dollar value of most was less than resident tuition. The new scholarship funds will allow the journalism school to have a flexible scholarship program, aiding both undergraduate and graduate students, both residents and non-residents, Rarick said.

Scholarships will be available to students in the news-editorial, advertising, public relations, radio/television news and photo journalism sequences.
