Safety, training center to open

A center to assist Oregon workers will be developed by the University's Labor Education and Research Center with a \$215,000 grant from the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

Word of the new grant came Monday Oct. 29 from U.S. Rep. Jim Weaver, D-Oregon.

The grant will fund the first year of a five-year project which will allow LERC to continue its

work with labor organizations and their members on safety and health issues, Emory Via, LERC director, said. The grant is part is OSHA's "New Directions" program.

There is urgent need for worker training in hazard recognition and abatement in Oregon, Via said. The nature of a number of industries in the state makes for a disproportionately high incidence of oc-

cupational hazards which can only be reduced by action in the workplace.

"As the only University labor education program in the Northwest, we take seriously our obligation to help provide Oregon workers with the ability to counter hazards on the job," Via said. "We can now push ahead with the program begun under a planning grant received last year."

A program which has received national attention is LERC's pilot effort to train workers as safety and health trainers.

Steve Deutsch, project coordinator, anticipates a major expansion of LERC's services to Oregon Workers under the new grant. He plans a substantial development of LERC's center. Additional staff will be hired to offer greater technical assistance to those confronting job safety and health problems.

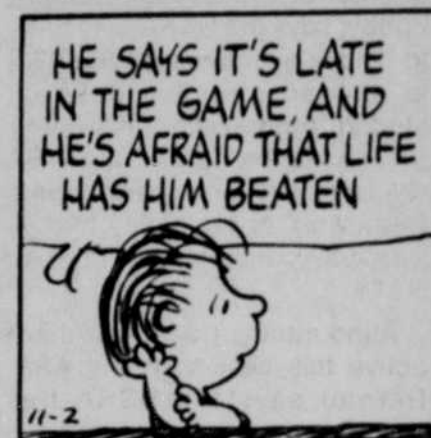
