

ask the sexpert

Q. I know I should not feel this way but I can't help feeling that when I go out with someone, and they pay for everything, that I owe them something — usually I end up sleeping with them, not because I really want to, but because I feel that it is expected. What do you think?

A. The rules are the same whether you are male or female. You don't owe your date sex. You don't owe him or her the exact dollar value in a return invitation or gift either. You owe your date courtesy, nothing more.

If you were invited out by a friend and you feel uncomfortable with the large amount of

money he or she spent, you can return the hospitality with an invitation for another date for which you will assume the cost; or if you do not want to spend any more time with the person, send a thank-you note or a gift.

Even if you decide to continue dating, the same rules still hold. Acceptance of an invitation, or many invitations, makes no commitment. If you decide you like one another well enough to have a sexual relationship (or if a sexual episode "just happens") again, the same rules apply: neither of you owes sex to the other in the future. If you please each other, the sexual relationship may continue at your mutual convenience and on mutual terms. Under these conditions, the decision to have sex is based on the quality of the relationship and not on any false expectations or insecurities.

Q. I have never had intercourse before; can I still be fitted for a diaphragm?

A. Yes you can, but the size of the diaphragm you need depends on the size and contour of your vagina which may change after you have had intercourse a few times. Planned Parenthood recommends that all new diaphragm users be rechecked after the first two weeks of use anyway. Another possibility would be to use a different method (foam and condom) the first few times you have sexual intercourse and

then be fitted for your diaphragm.

Q. Legally, what constitutes rape?

A. Although a dictionary definition of rape is the "act of taking anything by force," legally, rape is "carnal knowledge of a person by force against that person's will." Dorothy Hicks, director of a Rape Treatment Center in Miami, points out that in recent years, the term rape has been replaced by the inclusive terms sexual assault or sexual battery which include more sexual violations than forced vaginal penetration.

State laws are being rewritten to incorporate this broader concept. Legislators, in turn, have been changing the old rape laws to more comprehensive statutes encompassing sexual assault and involuntary sexual battery. These new laws have penalties that vary with the degree of force used, the type of assault, and the age of the victim. Moreover, these statutes provide penalties for forced fellatio, sodomy, and attempted sexual assault. Vaginal penetration is no longer necessary for a sexual assault to be considered a crime.

U.S. voters choose city, state officials

(AP) — Dennis Kucinich, the maverick mayor who withstood a recall election and two defaults on Cleveland's city debt, lost his bid for a second term Tuesday while Democrats turned aside spirited Republican challenges to retain governorships in Kentucky and Mississippi.

John Brown, a flamboyant millionaire, defeated former Republican Gov. Louie Nunn in Kentucky, while former Lt. Gov. William Winter won in Mississippi.

Ohio's Republican lieutenant governor, George Voinovich, led Kucinich, a tart-tongued, anti-establishment Democrat, 73,634 to 57,248 with most of Cleveland's vote counted.

In Philadelphia, former U.S. Rep. William Green easily defeated Republican David Marston in the race to succeed Mayor Frank Rizzo.

Boston Mayor Kevin White was re-elected to an un-

precedented fourth term, defeating a fellow Democrat, state Sen. Joseph Timilty.

Former Rep. Donald Fraser, a democrat, won the Minneapolis mayoral race against a field including former Mayor Charles Stenvig, and Salt Lake City Mayor Ted Wilson was leading in his bid for re-election.

In Mississippi, Winter thwarted Republican Gil Carmichael's bid to end 11 decades of Democratic control of the governorship. With more than a third of the vote counted, Winter led 159,617-110,981.

Mayors were being elected in 49 of the 163 cities with populations of more than 100,000.

Democratic Mayor William Schaefer won a third term in Baltimore, while Republican Mayor William Hudnut was reelected in Indianapolis. Democrat Biagio DiLieto was elected in New Haven where he bumped off Mayor Frank Logue in a primary election.

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THE de Frisco's TRADITION



"Building a legend among Eugene's beer drinkers"

- 1852 "Honest" Henry Meigs, alias "Don Enrique de Frisco," developer of San Francisco's North Beach area, opens San Francisco's famous Bush St. Music Hall. The de Frisco's tradition is born.
- 1854 Meigs splits for Tahiti loaded with \$17,000 worth of wine and gourmet delicacies, after appropriating over \$1,000,000 from the city treasury.
- 1877 "Don Enrique" dies in Peru a multi-millionaire builder of the famous railway system over the Andes that "couldn't be built." To celebrate the completion, Meigs threw perhaps the most extravagant party ever—a five steamship cruise costing 4-5,000,000 in today's dollars.
- 1977 On the 100th anniversary of Meigs' death, Dick Meigs, great, great nephew of the "beloved rogue," opens Eugene's de Frisco's, dedicated to the memory and style of his illustrious ancestor. The tavern featured Eugene's first serious selection of imported beers in a traditional atmosphere of solid oak and brass that would have made "Honest Henry" feel right at home. Leather pocketed pool tables and rosewood backgammon tables were built to exacting specifications in memory of Uncle Henry's highly refined sporting instincts.
- 1978 de Frisco's introduces world-famous Heineken and Guinness Stout on draft to the Eugene area. Among the many distinguished bottled beers introduced at de Frisco's during this time were Elephant Malt Liquor, Watney's and Pilsner Urquell, the original pilsner beer.
- 1978 de Frisco's undertakes and completes the expansion of Eugene's landmark tavern in an attempt to better meet the demands of the beer drinking public.
- TODAY Dick Meigs and his dedicated staff carry on the de Frisco's tradition, serving the world's outstanding beers to Eugene's discriminating drinkers.

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
