Former President Gerald Ford will give an informal public address at 10 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 14, at MacArthur Court on the University campus. The talk is expected to be wide-ranging, touching on the economy, military and defense issues, and reflections on the current American scene. Part of an on-going academic out-reach program of the American Enterprise Institute, Washington, D.C., the Ford visit also includes a faculty reception, a news conference, an invited luncheon with government and business leaders, and discussions with faculty and students of the School of Law and College of Business Administration. There is no admission charge for the 10 a.m. speech.

Mock GOP convention scheduled for May 9-11

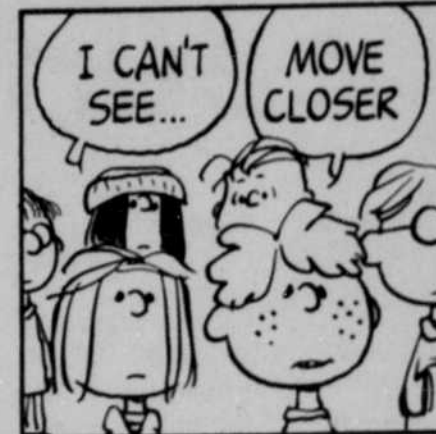

SCHOLARSHIPS

Faculty members and students who wish to study in Germany are eligible for a variety of fellowships from the German Academic Exchange Service. Study and research grants, summer language institutes and other programs are available for U.S. citizens. Graduate Fellowships in Science and Minority Graduate Fellowships in Science from the National Science Foundation are available to students in the mathematical, physical, medical, biological, engineering, and social sciences, in the history and philosophy of science, and in interdisciplinary areas. Those students who are American Indian, Alaskan Native, Black, Mexican

American/Chicano or Puerto Rican are eligible for the Minority Graduate Student Fellowship. For all of the above fellowships, students must be U.S. citizens or nationals. The deadline for the Graduate Student Fellowships is Nov. 29, 1979 and the deadline for the Minority Graduate Student Fellowships is Nov. 29, 1979.

A variety of fellowships and grants are available for both faculty and students from the Social Science Research Council. In many cases, fellowships are for study abroad. Faculty members in the social sciences and the humanities are eligible to apply. The deadline is December 1, 1979.
