

Citicorp loans protested

The Citicorp Financial Center at 990 Oak St. will be picketed today from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. by members of the People for Southern Africa Freedom.

According to PSAF representatives, the purpose of the picket is to inform Citicorp clients, potential clients and workers of Citicorp's financial support of South Africa and to urge them to terminate their relationship with Citicorp.

Citicorp, the second largest American bank, has loaned

South Africa more money than any other U.S. bank, according to a PSAF press release.

From 1972 to 1978, Citibank has participated in 33 loans totaling \$1.3 billion or 56 percent of the total U.S. loans to South Africa, says the release. These loans were to private South Africa corporations, South Africa's public "parastatal" corporations, and to the South African government, the release adds.

PSAF believes that the South

African government is gearing up for a protracted war against the 80 percent of its own population that opposes its racist politics. The PSAF release says U.S. based loans help finance such a "genocidal conflict."

In March 1978, Citicorp announced it would no longer loan money the release adds. But PSAF charges that Citicorp loans to government corporations and private South African corporations that support the government's apartheid policy.

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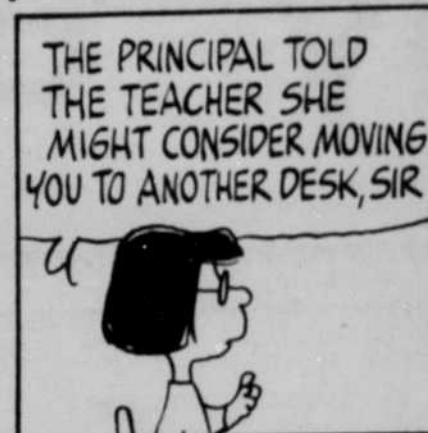
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MEETINGS
