

Sno-park permits available

Winter recreation parking permits (sno-park permits) are now available at all Motor Vehicles Division field offices as well as more than 50 other locations, such as ski shops and recreation areas which act as agents for the division.

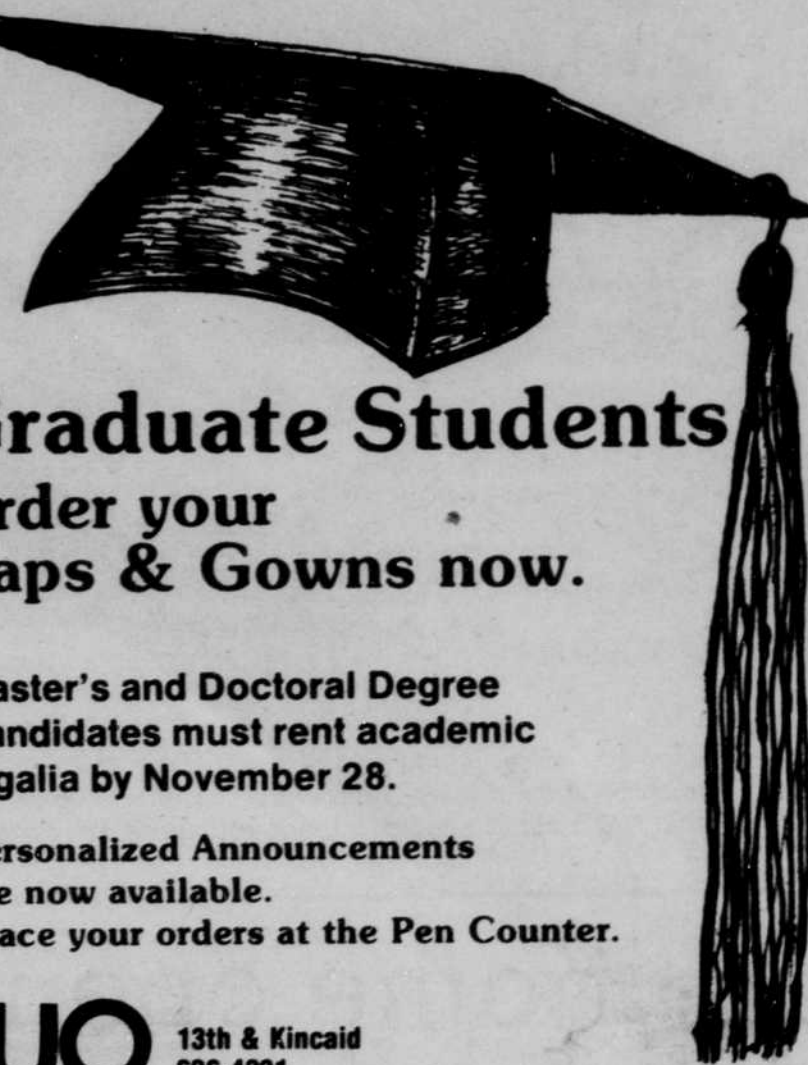
Sno-park permits must be displayed to park in designated winter recreation areas of the state through April 30.

The highway division has posted signs to tell people when they are entering areas where sno-park permits are needed. Some such areas are alongside roads in plow-outs provided for cross-country skiers to park. Permit areas also are located at downhill ski resorts and snowmobile parking facilities. Permits are required of all users of the parking areas, not just skiers

or snowmobilers.

Permits can be purchased for a day or an annual basis. A daily permits costs \$1, and an annual permit costs \$5.

The sno-permit program was initiated as a way to cover the cost of plowing these areas without using money from the highway fund.



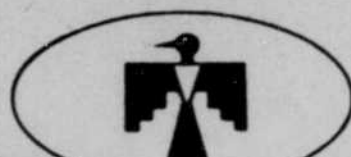
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Quackers capture third
