DA, Chapter Two and many others. In addition tours of the Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts Off-Broadway theatres in Greenwich Village the Museum of Modern Art and a professional costume shop are planned. There will be ample free-time to allow for sight-seeing shopping, and dining out.

The cost for the New York Theatre Visit will be \$670. This includes round trip air fare, theatre tickets, airport-hotel-airport transfers, and hotel accommodations.
