

Salem programs axed

The University is declaring a moratorium on the offering of public affairs courses and degree programs in the Salem area, according to University officials.

The moratorium calls a halt to plans to begin offering a master's degree program in public affairs in Salem starting in January. Two courses, one in public policy analysis and the other in budgetary administration, were to have been offered winter term.

The program had been designed for individuals working in state, county or local government or for non-profit organizations, according to program descriptions.

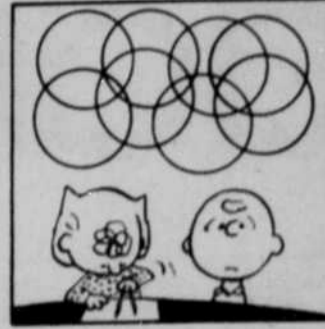
"The decision not to offer the

program has been made out of respect for Willamette University and its Atkinson Graduate School of Administration," says Robert Albrecht, University vice provost.

According to Richard Hall, dean of the Wallace School of Community Service and Public Affairs which developed the Salem program, some 800 public employees in the Salem area recently received an educational needs assessment survey.

"Even with the moratorium, we hope the individuals who received the survey will complete and return the forms," Hill says, noting the results will be made available, as planned, to any institution interested in using the results for educational planning purposes.
