

Library helps research papers

The library is offering students a cure for the term paper blues with personal assistance that can make research quicker and easier.

The library's advisory service assistance is not like a "let's get acquainted with the library" class, says Claire Meyer, a reference librarian and head of the Catalog Information Service. The service takes about half an hour and will cover only the student's research topic.

A student can get research help on almost any subject offered by the University.

Although some students are pressed for time or too embarrassed to ask for help, half an hour with a librarian who knows exactly where to look will save hours of search.

"The student does nothing, but come in to the CIS desk and ask for help on a term paper. The rest is up to us. It's real simple," Meyer says.

Students seeking assistance set up an interview and an appointment to talk with a librarian. In between the interview and the appointment, the librarian has time to prepare a "research strategy" and will be prepared for the student when they meet, Meyer says. Students are welcome even if they've only picked their research topic, she adds.

She says that librarians normally don't have enough time to put out a great deal of effort to help students, but this service allows librarians to help students properly and thor-

oughly because librarians have designated times they will help students.

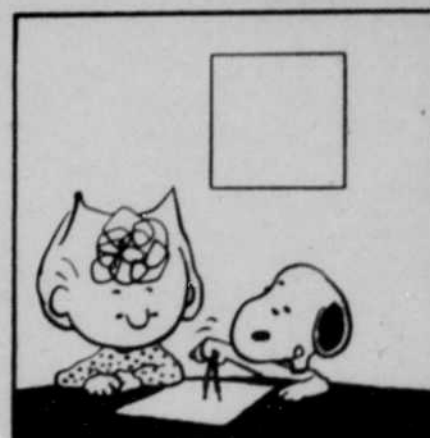
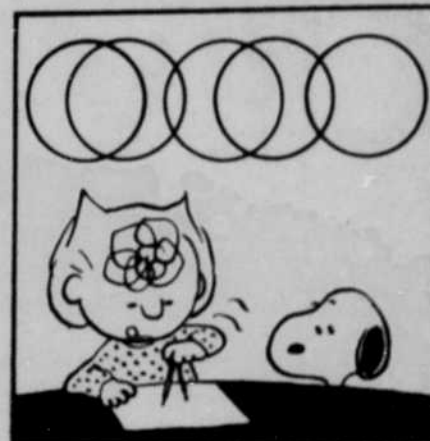
Aulani Mahoe, one of the students helped through this service last year, says her librarian was very helpful. "She gathered a lot of information. In fact, she had it all prepared before I came in. I was really shocked," she says.

"I just said what I was doing my report on, and when I had my appointment, she had all these books laid out for me. And then she even gave me more places to look," Mahoe adds.

Meyer says students who have used the service are very pleased with it.

Students can take advantage of this service until Dec. 5. It will be offered again Spring term.
