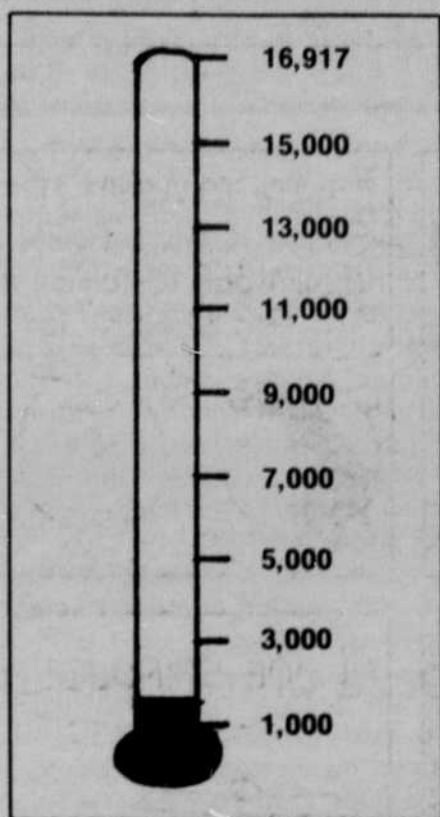


Feed Cambodia Drive nears \$2,000 mark

The University Fund to Feed Cambodia Drive has reached an estimated \$2,000 since Friday, according to Jess Barton, co-organizer of the drive.

"The money is coming in pretty good," Barton says. "We should make it to \$2,000 today." Barton says he is pleased with the student volunteer effort in staffing donation tables, but the volunteers are thinning out.

"We could use some help staffing tables. We're getting by just grabbing people as they walk by, but I'd rather have it all lined up," he says.

Michael Lacey, chair of the University Students for Cambodian Relief, says response to the drive has been satisfactory, but he would like to see more students donating one dollar, rather than fewer students donating larger sums of money.

"If every student put in one

dollar, it would be easy to reach our goal," he says. Lacey hopes to raise \$16,917 — one dollar for every University student — before Dec. 15.

"In the fishbowl I see people with bagels, donuts and tea who tell me they don't have any money," Lacey says. "They do have money. What they don't have is a conscience."

"It would be good if every student went hungry for a day to see what it's like. Every student should donate a dollar instead of buying bagels, donuts and coffee."

Scott Bassett, ASUO president, says he will meet with

dormitory advisory boards to encourage dorm residents to get behind the campaign.

Lacey says he is happy to see that "Bassett has examined his

conscience and is now completely behind the campaign."

Bassett says he supported the drive from the start. "I'm behind this 100 percent," he says.

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Bikers request ranking of transportation goals

The University of Oregon for Better Biking Committee met yesterday to discuss the future of campus biking in relation to an overall University transportation plan.

Don Chalmers, director of the Office of Student Advocacy, said the University should establish a hierarchy among transportation modes and offered the University of Washington Policy Statement on transportation as an example. Committee members agreed that University policy should rank transportation modes.

ASUO Pres. Scott Bassett and Carl Hosticka, a community service and public affairs professor, introduced a statement of biking committee goals and a summary tabulation of the University's proposed capital construction program for 1981 through 1987.

Committee goals include the following: funding for implementation of the University Bicycle Plan; increased community support of campus bike travel; the encouragement of campus traffic regulations and educating the University community on the effective use of bicycles and the disadvantages of building more parking structures.

The summary tabulation lists \$420,000, drawn from "highly competitive funds," to finance improvement of campus bicycle facilities. Committee members agreed that funds from other sources are badly needed.

Hosticka also introduced a draft of a University policy statement on bicycle transportation which he said is an example of the policy he would like to see adopted. The statement requests that the University recognize energy conservation, Carter's call for local energy conservation action, Oregon's transportation objective to promote biking and walking, and relief of the present "chaotic condition of bicycle use" on campus.

Better Biking Committee chair Steve Brian said he will investigate the possibility of Lane Transit District bus service on campus. The Committee discussed the possibility of buses being University-owned but LTD-serviced.

Chalmers said students can further the cause of campus bicycle transportation by buying a bicycle at a bike auction, scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 8.

According to campus security, the bikes to be sold at the auction have all been impounded on campus. Viewing of the bikes will begin at 8 a.m. on the EMU breezeway and continue until the auction begins at 9:30 a.m. The auction will run until all bikes are sold, a campus security representative said.

Proceeds from the auction will go toward improving bicycle transportation on campus, Chalmers said.

The next Better Biking Committee meeting will be Wednesday during the first week of winter term, time and room to be announced.

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
