

Campus fund drive generates \$3,000

Now in its second week, the University for Cambodia fund-raising drive has raised more than \$3,000, says Michael Lacey, drive organizer.

Lacey says he will seek faculty and staff contributions today in letters sent through the University distribution center. The letters describe the starvation deaths of millions of Cambodians and ask for a donation.

"Faculty and staff have come to me saying they want to contribute but don't have any place to do it. It's good to give them a central place to send their money."

Contributions can be made to the Oxfam Cambodian Relief Fund or the Unicef Cambodian Relief Fund care of Lacey, 823 PLC or Suite 4, EMU.

Lacey says he is happy to see some campus groups taking the initiative on the campaign. The Hamilton Dorm President's Council set up a donation bottle in the Hamilton cafeteria after he and ASUO Pres. Scott Bassett talked to the Council Thursday night, Lacey says.

Some fraternities agreed to fast one night last week and donate the money saved to the drive, he says.

"I'm extremely happy with the student participation, but we still have a long way to go."

Lacey's goal is to raise \$16,917 — \$1 for every University student — by Friday.

"If everybody puts just \$1 into one of the collection boxes, we can still make it," he says.

New dean search begins

The University has launched an internal search for a successor to John Baldwin, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, who plans to resign his position and return to teaching June 30.

John Orbell, head of the political science department and chair of the search committee, says the committee intends the search procedures to be as open as possible, with the opinions of faculty, students and department heads considered in both formal and informal ways. He adds that the committee's procedures should be completed this week.

Criteria for the position are:

- Holding the rank of tenured associate professor or higher in any academic unit at the University.
- Recording accomplishments in scholarship and teaching.
- Demonstrating administrative ability.
- Having a commitment to affirmative action policies and goals.
- Being familiar with the College of Arts and Sciences at the University and having appreciation of its component parts.

- Understanding the roles of the professional schools at the University.

Deadline for applications and nominations is 5 p.m. Jan. 11. Applications should be sent to Orbell at the Institute for Social Science Research in Room 837 PLC.

The committee will select a list of three to five finalists for University Pres. William Boyd's final approval by April 1, Orbell says.

Committee members are Richard Brown, history; Edwin Coleman, English; Colette

Craig, linguistics; Edith Hise, speech; Esther Jacobson-Leong, art history; Miriam Johnson, sociology; Michael Menaker, biology; Richard Noyes, chemistry; and Donald Tull, marketing.

Scott Bassett, ASUO president, and one other student will also be members of the search committee.

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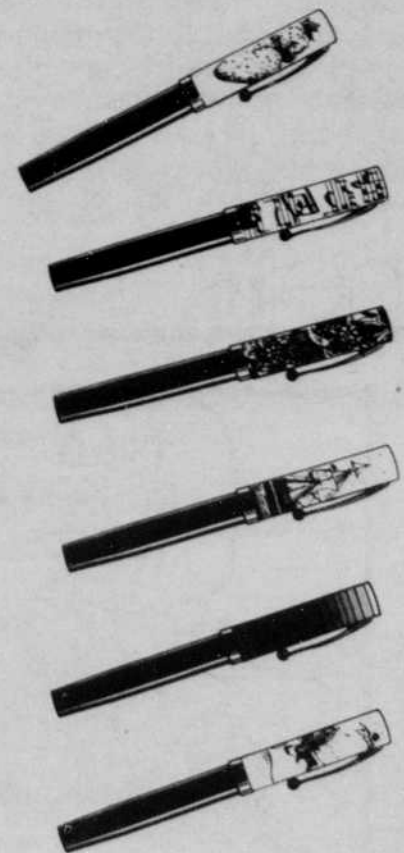


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
