

Women shocked in semifinals of Shocker

The Oregon women's basketball team learned the hard way that history doesn't always repeat itself as they dropped a surprising 83-79 decision to the New Mexico Lobos and went on to finish the Shocker Tournament in Wichita, Kan., in third place, a lower than expected finish for the highly regarded Ducks.

Oregon defeated Illinois State 93-68 Saturday for the third

place finish, and raised the team's season record to 6-4. The game was tied at halftime, but in the second half everything went right for the Ducks. They broke it open with a run of 25-1 to finish off the Redbirds.

The Ducks weren't favored to win the tournament. Fifteenth-ranked Kansas State was the top seed, with Oregon the second seed. But considering that the Ducks and the Lobos

played at McArthur Court last season where Oregon soundly defeated them 104-71, most observers expected Oregon to have few if any problems handling the Lobos in the second round of the Shocker Tournament. That would have set up a championship contest pitting the Ducks against Kansas State. But the Lobos made sure that game never came about.

New Mexico was ahead of

Oregon in every phase of the game by a wide margin, including shooting, freethrows and rebounds, yet the Ducks kept the game close. Oregon led by two at halftime, was tied with the Lobos at 62 with just over nine minutes left, and was still within two points of New Mexico with as little as 39 seconds remaining. However, the Lobos put the game away by successfully converting on four consecutive

free throws.

Bev Smith was named the tournament's most valuable player, hitting almost 70 percent of her shots and averaging 23 points and almost 14 rebounds in the three games.

The Ducks begin their defense of the Northwest league championship on the road Friday and Saturday with games against Seattle and Washington.

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
