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Indian affairs symposium set

Conflicts between economic development on Indian reservations and traditional tribal values in the Pacific Northwest will be the focus of a day-long symposium on Friday, Jan. 25, in the EMU.

Sponsored by the University Native American Student Union, the symposium will examine the direction that Northwest interior tribes are taking in economic

development, according to Antone Minthorn, a symposium coordinator. Representatives from the Colville and Yakima reservations in Washington and the Warm Springs Reservation in Oregon will discuss developments on their lands, including mining, timbering and production factories.

"We will also be looking at the value systems used by policy

makers who recommend economic development projects for reservations in comparison with the traditional Indian tribal values," Minthorn said.

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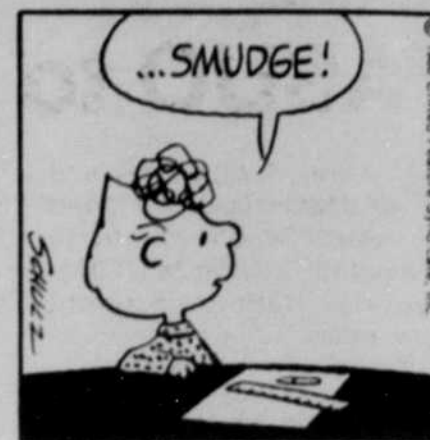
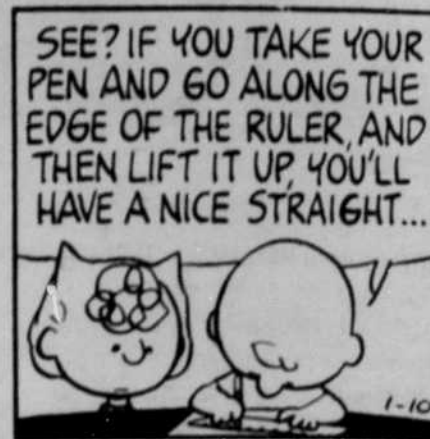
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Teacher seminar slated

The University has been selected by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) to host one of 120 Summer Seminars for College Teachers this summer.

The seminar, titled "Violence in American History," will be taught June 16-Aug. 8 by University history professor Richard Maxwell Brown.

Designed for teachers of history, political science, literature and sociology, the seminar will focus on the significance of violence in American history. Historical and behavioral theor-

ies of violence in American history including frontier, racial, ethnic, labor, agrarian and Western violence will be studied.

Twelve college teachers will be selected to attend each seminar. Participants will receive \$2,500 stipends for travel expenses, books, research materials and housing.
