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Law school fills honorary position

Willard Wirtz, the secretary of labor during the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, has been chosen as the first occupant of the Wayne Morse Chair of Law and Politics at the University.

In this capacity, Wirtz will be at the University the week of Feb. 18 for a lecture, several seminars and other meetings with faculty and students.

In making the announcement,

University Pres. William Boyd said, "The selection of Willard Wirtz is most appropriate, as he has been recognized as an able mediator in labor disputes and an expert on unemployment and manpower issues. During his lifetime, Oregon's Wayne Morse too was called on to deal with national labor crises, and was known for seeking decisions fair to both management and labor."

Wirtz currently chairs the board of the National Manpower Institute in Washington, D.C., a nonprofit research and policy development organization that projects changing manpower needs. He formerly was on the law faculty at Northwestern University in Illinois.

The idea for the chair was originated in 1975 to honor Morse, former professor and dean of the University law school.

To date, approximately \$250,000 has been raised for the project from private and federal sources by the UO Foundation, working with a committee of distinguished individuals from throughout the country. The fund-raising effort is continuing.

The occupants of the chair will be persons who exemplify Wayne Morse's principles and achievements, and will be chosen on the basis of integrity and independence, scholarship and teaching ability, and contributions to world peace, representative government and rule of law, according to Chapin Clark, dean of the University law school and chair of the committee planning the Wirtz visit.

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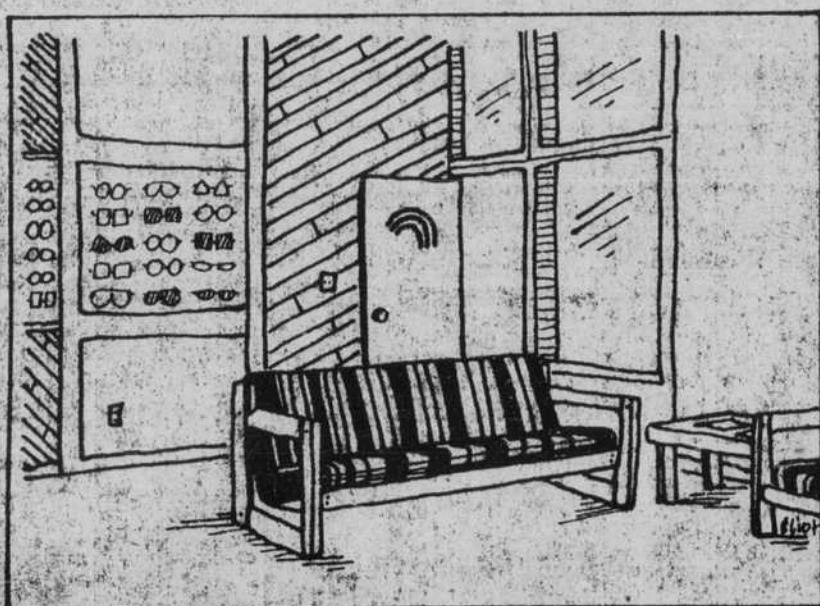
