



Exchange program forms available

Oregon residents can attend colleges from Massachusetts to Hawaii without paying out-of-state tuition through the National Student Exchange Program.

Applications for this year's program can be found in 164 Oregon Hall beginning Feb. 1.

Exchange students can choose from 31 schools in the

United States, ranging from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst to the University of Hawaii at Manoa. NSE Coordinator Joe Wade or his assistant, Mike McGregor, conducts interviews with prospective exchange students to make sure that requirements are met.

In order to participate in the program, a student must be an

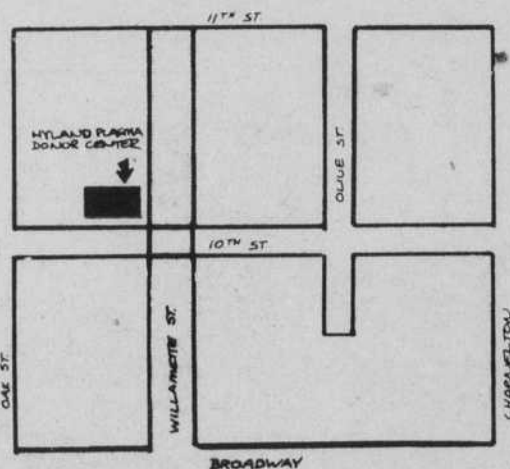
Oregon resident, have a 2.5 grade point average and be a sophomore or junior during the exchange year.

Winter degree applications due

The list of degree candidates for winter term graduation is already growing at the registrar's office in Oregon Hall.

All applications for degrees this term must be turned in to the Office of the Registrar by Friday, Jan. 25. This date is firm, since time must be set aside for checking, clearing and printing operations. Students who miss the deadline must apply at a later date.

To qualify for a degree, a student must have completed all

necessary work and procedures for that degree by the end of the winter term. All transcripts from other schools which are pertinent to the degree should be sent to the registrar's office immediately, so that they can be on file before the March 21 deadline. These transcripts include those credits taken through the continuing education division.

Any student who has applied before but did not receive the degree must apply again.
