

'Glyphs' fulfills creative needs

Those with the need to create a literary or graphic masterpiece will find an outlet in this year's edition of "Glyphs," published by the Honors College.

The college is currently soliciting material for the third annual edition, to be published this spring.

The magazine will accept several forms of printable works

— short stories, poetry and graphics. Publication is open to anyone, says Molly Westling, faculty advisor for "Glyphs." Six pages is the approximate limit for short stories, she says.

All entries should be turned into the Honors College office on the third floor of Chapman Hall by March 15. They should include name, address and

phone number.

Westling encourages students to participate. The magazine "gives students an opportunity to publish their work and receive feedback," she says, adding that all entries will be returned with commentary by the student editors.

The magazine will sell for \$1.25, says Westling. She hopes to print about 200 copies and concentrate sales in the University area.
