

Theologian to lecture May 6-8

John Cobb Jr., a theology professor at Claremont Graduate School in California, will present a series of lectures May 6-8 at the University.

The lectures are open to the public and will be held nightly at 7:30 p.m. in the Erb Memorial Union Ballroom.

Cobb has written extensively on Protestant theology and its relation to philosophical and social issues. His opening lec-

ture on May 6, "The Social Gospel and Origins of the Chicago School," will offer some theological approaches to social problems in America.

On May 7, Cobb will discuss the limitations of political theology, and on May 8, his topic will be the political implications of process theology.

An informal meeting with Cobb also will be held at 3 p.m. May 8 at the Koinonia, 1414

Kincaid St. The meeting is open to the public.

Cobb's visit is sponsored by the University Department of Religious Studies' annual Distinguished Visiting Lectureship.

Cobb is regarded as the leader of process theology, a major movement in contemporary American Protestantism. He has taught theology at Claremont since 1958 and is the author of 10 books.

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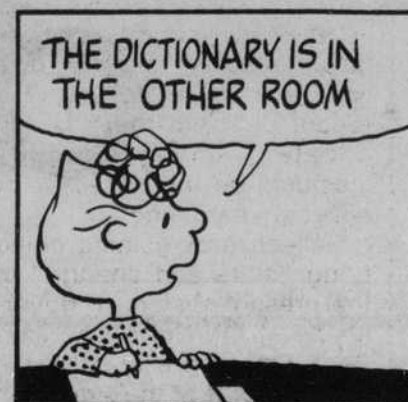
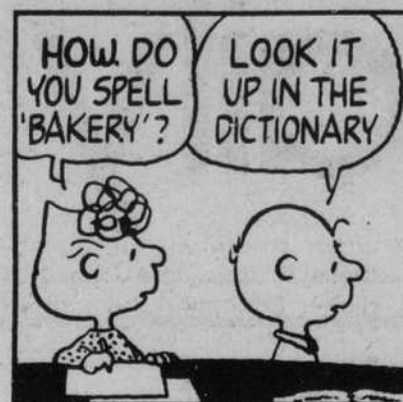
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MEETINGS

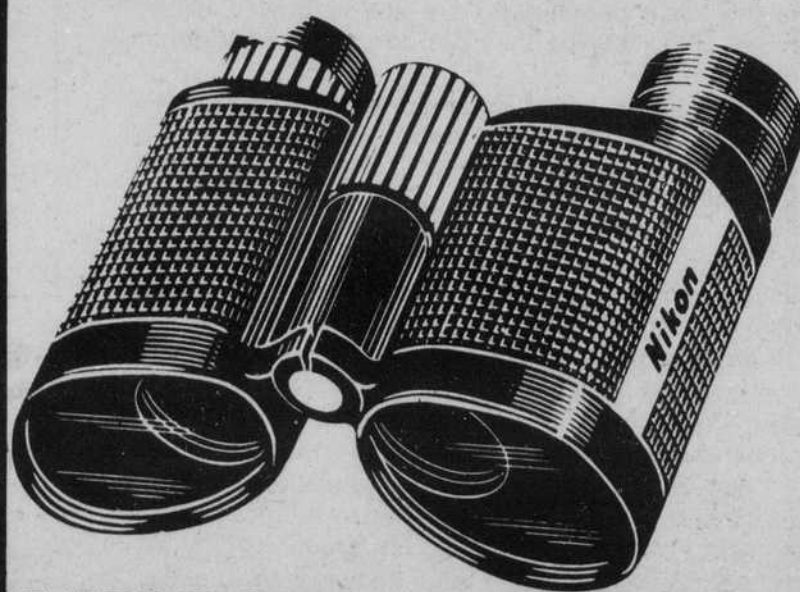
Gary Sidder will speak about "Tungsten Exploration in the Yukon-Tanana Upland, Alaska" at 1 p.m. today 307 Volcanology.
